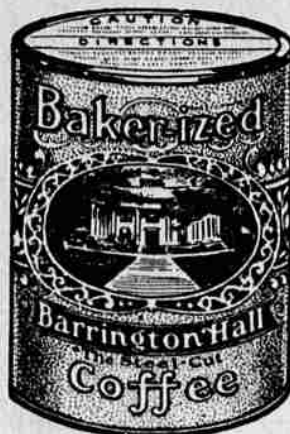

EDUCATION OF CHILD MADE CLEAR BY PARENT PAPER

The following article was read at the parent-teachers meeting held in Rivera school last Friday afternoon. It contains some good advice and will no doubt be read with profit. It contains advice in handling children of school age and is given by Mrs. Jno. Shaw who herself is wrestling with the problem of rearing children.

In training our children, we should begin when they first begin to understand. Teach them obedience—that what we tell them to do, must be done. The way to do this is never to say we will punish them, unless we intend to do so. They will soon learn that the thing to do is to obey. What children see in their homes they will seek to imitate, if we mothers remain firm. But this must be done in a loving way. We can print on the child's mind a memory that will last even after the child has left home to battle with the world. They will still cling to that dear old memory of home and mother. Nor should we keep our children too close, nor prevent them from enjoying their young lives in the association of their playmates. Parents should not go to any place that is not fit for the boy or the girl. Do not entertain at a card party unless you expect your children to do so too. Do not prevent them from having young companions, but see to it that they go to the very best places and be sure they are with good company, and they will naturally look forward to the best things in life. Send them to school neat and clean, for there is no teacher who admires a dirty boy or girl. Nine teachers out of ten will do the right thing by a child, if we ourselves do our duty, and let them know that we are sending our children to school that they learn obedience. Do not say: "Jimmie, you must go to school. I want you to be a good boy, but if you are punished at school I will punish you when you get home." They will

will be clear, that of the child. They will say: "Mamma the teacher treats me mean and won't help me get my problems, or mamma the teacher, has pets." Just have a heart to heart talk with them and tell them that you fear the fault lies with them; come home from school with tales of woe and only one side of the story tell them they must get on the good side of the teacher and in place of throwing stones, throw candy. In every instance where things are righted, the child will see that the teachers is not altogether at fault, and will soon be coming home telling how good the teacher is.

There are many ways in which we should manage to bring up our children to be good men and women. Once in a while there is a child that can not be made to mind by punishing it. That child should be dealt with in a different manner. Talk kind to them, hire them, tell them that you will get them a new wheel or something they will prize, if they will make their grade. Before you know it, you have won the victory. Let them go places, if it is home with the neighbors boy, let him go, and let them have their young sport. Have a time limit for their return, say five o'clock in summer and earlier in winter and they will soon form the habit of being at home at a regular hour. Be punctual and your children will be. Give the boy spending money, but teach him to spend it in a decent way, teach him to know the value of money. Teach them to do a thing if they say they will do it, even if it costs them pain.

Teach them to pray and teach them the truth. Teach them that we are only living for their good and welfare. Give them love at all times and that home is made for their dear sakes. Make home the dearest spot on earth.
