Surrender is Rumored.

El Paso, March 31.—Reports are
current that an armistice has been
agreed upon between the Rebels and

the Federals, at Torreon to enable
General Velasco, the Federal com-
mander, to negotiate terms of sur-
render. Officers close to Carranza,
partly confirmed the stories.

VALUABLE HORSE DIES.

P. A. McDonald Horse Herd Suffers
from Vitrolized Wheat.

Three valuable draft horses owned
by P. A. McDonald died yesterday
of poisoning from vitrolized wheat. A
herd of six of these valuable horses
had broken into a vitrolized wheat bin,
and though three are dead, it is be-
lieved the balance will be saved. Dr.
P. A. Charlton was called to the ranch
yesterday, the poisoned wheat hav-
ing been eaten Sunday, and the vet-
erinary believes that the three will sur-
vive the effects.

Last Day for Taxes.

Advices from the state at large is
that taxpayers who were in the
doubtful column about taxes, have
taken what they deem a safe attitude
and are rushing to tax collectors with
half payments of taxes before the end
of today. By April first, if the pres-
ent law is upheld penalties of one
percent each month begin, but the
Cleeton decision is generally admitted
good for the half payment plan.
About 80 percent of the Union coun-
ty taxes have been paid in and those
who are in late, are, like so many
of the state, rushing in today with

half payments, taking chances on the
balance escaping penalty.
