Politics in France.

Americans generally know as little about French politics as Frenchmen know about ours. Issues, methods and parties in the two countries are radically different. In France parties are so many in number and so small in membership that they are usually designated as groups rather than as parties. It is always necessary to combine the forces of three or more of them to constitute a majority in the chamber of deputies, and that can be done only by giving each group a representation in the cabinet. The parliamentary system of France resembles that of Great Britain in this: When the chamber gives a vote adverse to the ministry, the ministry resigns. But that means only that a new alliance is formed that includes groups other than those represented in the retiring ministry. As a consequence it usually happens that some members of the defunct cabinet are retained in the cabinet that succeeds it.—Youth's Companion.

CITIZENS OF ISLAND LOYAL

NEEDED IMPROVEMENTS TO
CHURCH DISCUSSED.

Public Meeting Held and Plans Made
to Raise Funds.

Citizens of Island City, belonging to the different denominations got together at a supper last night, held in I. O. O. F. Hall to discuss, a problem connected with the Union Church of that place. Space for Sunday School meetings has become too scant, and to remedy this and liquidate the indebtedness now resting on the church, persons interested in the enlargement and beautifying of the church met for mutual discussion of plans.

Ed Kiddle opened the meeting and briefly explained the object of the meeting. Mrs. A. R. Hunter then spoke on "The Adult Bible Class." Mrs. Garret Blockland spoke on the "Ladies Aid." Walter Williams superintendent of the Sunday School, and Mrs. C. H. Bidwell, county superintendent of Sunday Schools made addresses. Ed Kiddle then read a statement of the church's finances. J. H. Rudd, secretary of the local Y. M. C. A., spoke on the returns for giving to a noble cause. Rev. W. T. Beatty, A. R. Hunter, T. J. Schroeder, J. C. Kennedy, Mr. Johnson, and Miss Reba Williamson likewise made addresses.

The sum of \$1,400 will be needed according to the estimates submitted by Mr. Kiddle, and this is to be collected by subscription and in various other ways. A committee of nine headed by Mr. Kiddle was appointed to have charge of the soliciting of funds.

San Francisco, April 2.—What the weight of a loaf of bread is was a question put up here today to the Board of Supervisors. It was also developed that until the government fixed a standard for bread that it will not help the consumer much for the reason that the amount of water that can be put into bread varies from 28 to 50 per cent.
