BIG CHERRY DEAL PENDING

UNMARKETABLE FRUIT MAY BE SOLD AT WENATCHEE.

Sixty Dollars Per Ton Offered for Wenatchee Goods.

That Wenatchee will supply the Oregon Packing company and other firms with cherries for maraschinos is indicated from the following dispatch to the Spokesman Review from Wenatchee:

Manager Robinson of the Oregon Packing company of Portland and San Francisco is holding conferences with officials of the Wenatchee Produce company and the Wenatchee Valley Fruit Growers' association, relative to contracting for the unmarketable cherries of the valley. He offers 3 cents a pound or \$60 the ton and desires the greater part of the crop. Growers desiring to negotiate with the packing company may do so through the produce company or the association before April 15.

The Oregon packing company will convert the cherries into maraschinos. If the company comes here the cherries will be barreled with a liquid preservative and shipped to Portland or San Francisco.

"I consider this a first-class proposal for the fruit growers," said Harry Crowl of the Wenatchee Produce company. "We never have made any money on Royal Anns and do not care to handle them if there is another way provided. Should the Oregon Packing company come in here they will arrange for a warehouse on Columbia street and may possibly arrange to handle some varieties of pears as well as cherries, and possibly some other kinds of fruit."
