SEEKS SUPREME COURT POSITION AT PRIMARY.

Willamette University Graduate; Born in Oregon.

Samuel T. Richardson of Salem, candidate on the Republican ticket for the supreme court of Oregon is in the city in the interest of his candidacy. Mr. Richardson was born in Scio, Oregon and is a native product, having taken his law degree at the Willamette University. He was admitted to the bar in 1884 and has been teaching and practicing for the last 30 years. He was chairman of the committee to revise the judicial procedure and states that in the administration of his office as supreme court justice, should he be elected to that position, he will not make laws but will strive to determine them to the best of his ability.

Mr. Richardson has the legal temperament and while he knows many things in the profession are not what they should be, is nevertheless optimistic about the future and hopes lawyers will in time come to a hearty realization of their important duty to society.
