WM. PACKWOOD GREET'S "PAL"

FORTY-NINER WRITES INTERESTINGLY.

Regrets He Cannot Come to Union County to Visit Old Chums.

Uncle Tom Currey of Imbler, is rich in pioneer lore; likewise is Wm. H. Packwood, of Baker. Between the two have recently passed several letters of historical value, and the Observer, through permission of Mr. Currey today publishes a recent letter from Mr. Packwood, it being the answer to a letter from Mr. Currey inviting the aged Baker veteran to come to Imbler to attend a coming meeting of the Farmers' Union. Mr. Packwood, whose daughter married Attorney John Rand, of Baker, was a member of the original constitutional convention in Oregon. He says among other things to Mr. Currey:

Baker, Ore., Mr. Thos. W. Curry, Dear sir:—"At your meeting, I have no doubt I would meet some of my old friends and their children, whom I knew in the early sixties at Auburn and on the Snake river when I ran the ferries on the Snake river, Olds, Washes, and Central and Toll Road on the road to the Boise mines. They were freighters and a more honorable class of men I never dealt with than they were. Many of them settled in your beautiful valley, I wish to be remembered to them, one and all; and I have no doubt I would have enjoyed being with you and the Farmers Union.

I was a member of the Farmers convention that framed the Constitution of Oregon in 1857. There were sixty members; I am the only one left of the sixty. Fifty nine have passed over the river and I will follow them very soon. I crossed the plains to California in 1849. I came to Oregon in April 1850. My class is nearly "all in", few 49ers are left.

Judge Gaston in his "History of Oregon," in summing up of officers of the Indian wars of 1855 and 1856, says that there are only two left today. All gone except Major James Bruce and me. I was a captain, I however know of one alive who was a lieutenant which would leave three. Major Bruce and Lieutenant Abbot are both older than I am and I may be the last officer of the wars of fifty nine years ago. It is not however the length of time a man lives but what he does while here, and I do not believe when I am gone that I will be classed as a drone among the pioneers of our grand country.
