BIG AUDIENCE HEARS SMALL

NATIONAL PROHIBITION APPROACHES SAYS SMALL.

Southern Evangelist Holds Audience for Two Hours.

A large number of La Grande people last evening heard Sam Small the Southern evangelist and national prohibition worker speak for two hours on that subject. Eloquently he painted word pictures of the fight leading up to the passage of the Kenyon bill prohibiting shipment of liquor into dry territory, and he predicted that by 1920 the people of America will have passed a national amendment prohibiting the manufacture, for sale, of liquor in this country.

There is but one way to effectually attain our goal" said the speaker "and that is by national prohibition. State's rights do not enter in, but to obtain the national amendment it is expedient to have more states dry that is the order at present."

Sam Small is a typical Southerner, falls into the Southern dialect, uses homely illustrations that leave no doubt of their meaning however, and when incidents prompt, can show his temper. A little girl coughed in the gallery and the speaker stopped abruptly, exclaiming: "Somebody take care of that kid up there—it is annoying the audience." The embarrassed mother who had hoped to hear the much-famed speaker, hastily withdrew from the house in confusion. It took some time for the speaker to get back into the good graces of the audience again.

The two-hour speech was given a rhetorically brilliant rounding up by an appeal for votes for the national prohibition amendment when the time

came, and the time—he said the brewers and distilleries themselves know better than anyone that the amendment is coming sooner or later.

The plan tentatively advanced by the distilleries is to surrender provided time would be given, say 10 years, to dispose of the bonded stock, said Rev. Small.
