so far as known there is no positive proof of this. Local consumers have, in the past week or two, taken back to their grocery men, dozen after dozen of eggs which though not packed eggs, have every characteristic of a packed egg. Merchants have reason to believe that no poultryman is going to pack eggs when eggs are high in the winter time and unload them at the

most bearish period of the year. Hence the packed egg theory is utter fallacy it seems. Owners of incubators test the fertility of eggs for three days, and those not fertile are thrown away—usually boiled and fed to young chicks, but the belief exists that some of these are finding their way to the local market. The shell of course is not changed by the incubator test, and in fact the candle process fails to disclose imperfections. Much grief, at any rate has been caused here by the eggs, regardless of what may be the cause.

"That sale of incubator eggs is not a local matter but one which has general use, even though an outrage, is indicated by trade journals" said a local merchant today. "I have here a clipping from the Grocer and Country Merchant published at San Francisco which goes on to say:

A number of poultry raisers, it seems, are putting on the market infertile eggs that have been tested in incubators from three days to a week. As soon as the breeder finds that the eggs will not hatch he takes them out and sends them to market along with his fresh spring eggs. After the eggs have been in the incubator for this period they are distinctly stale and rot very quickly if kept any length of time. Even when just taken from the incubator these infertile eggs are not fit for boiling, although they may be used for frying, and are good for cake or certain other baked foods. These eggs when they reach the market, however, are classified as low grade No. 2.

CHINESE EGGS COMING.

Biggest Consignment Yet Leaves Seattle for California.

Seattle, April 14.—The biggest consignment of Chinese eggs ever imported into this country, 270,000 dozen, will be part of the cargo of the steamship Senator, which will sail from here tonight for San Francisco. The eggs were brought across the Pacific from Hong Kong, aboard the C. P. R. Liner Empress of Russia, and were discharged at Vancouver. They will be taken aboard the Senator there.

WEATHER FORECASTS.

Method of Tracing the Direction and Speed of Storms.

Most of the severe storms do not originate in the United States. They come to us from the Philippines, Japan, Siberia, Alaska, Canada or the gulf of Mexico. Our weather bureau gets cable, telegraphic or wireless notice of a foreign storm. Station after station of the weather bureau and vessel after vessel in the path of the storm report its arrival, so that the general direction and the speed with which it travels can be very nearly determined. Some storms can be foretold as much as ten days in advance of their arrival at a given point.

When a storm from Siberia drifts eastward around the north pole and reappears in Alaska the speed with which it has covered that section of its course is made the basis of the calculation of the time when it should appear in Washington and Oregon, when it should get to the great lakes and finally to the Atlantic coast, and each section is warned in advance. Unexpected conditions may delay the storms or divert them from the course. Tabs are kept on the cold waves in much the same manner. The weather reports from Canada, Iceland, Europe, Russia and Siberia are studied and predictions made as to when the cold waves from these countries will reach the United States.

To predict floods information is recorded as to the amount of rainfall at headwaters of streams. As the rain reaches the main channel the height of the water is recorded from gaugings. Records show what a height of twenty feet at Dubuque, Ia., will produce at Davenport, eighty miles down the Mississippi. This plan is followed on all the large rivers, and at each station full allowance is made for the effects of water from tributaries and from additional and local rainfall.—Leslie's.

The First Revolver.
The credit or discredit of the invention of the revolver belongs to a Swiss of Valloire, Jean Francois Grobet, who in 1814 fashioned, with the collaboration of his son, the first "six shooter" which as a matter of fact attracted the attention of the then minister of Russia at Zurich, Count Capo d'Istria, who sent a specimen revolver to Czar Alexander I. The royal recipient rewarded the inventor with a valuable ring, which it is to be presumed Grobet pawned, for he died a few years later in poverty.—Los Angeles Telegraph.
