CAIRNS MEETINGS START

WHOLE MEMBERSHIPS SELDOM A UNIT HE SAYS.

One-fourth Do All the Paying and All Praying Avers Speaker.

An interested audience listened to Rev. G. R. Cairns last evening at the Baptist church. The congregation was carried along with the speaker from the beginning to the end. Mr. Cairns is intensely in earnest and wins his hearers by his methods and pungent and practical preaching.

Last evening the evangelist spoke on the theme, "God's Method of personal work." He said, "the church that waits until the whole membership is ready for a revival will never have one. Jesus Himself had two classes of disciples,—the inner and the outer circle, Peter, James and John composed the former and the remaining nine the latter. In the average church, one-fourth of the members do all the paying and praying. Such a church could go on indefinitely if the other three-fourths were to pass away."

"In that outer circle are the ones who say, 'the converts do not stick.' The reason they do not stick is because there is frequently nothing to 'stick' to. If the church is cold and indifferent, the spiritually born babe has about as much chance to live as a physically born babe would have in a refrigerator. The need of the hour is a revival church."
