PRICE TO PRODUCER IS 22 CENTS LOCALLY.

Various Greenstuffs Go Down This Morning in Local Markets.

Up swings the price pendulum on eggs! Twenty-five cents retail, 22 cents to producer is the quotation today.

Not all food commodities that change today, have gone up however. Tomatoes, Florida grown principally, are 5 cents cheaper, green onions cheaper, rhubarb, home grown, cheaper and grapefruit, principally because the larger sizes are carried almost exclusively, is quoted at 20 cents or three for 35c.
