NATIONAL FORESTS MANY USES

Almost every conceivable use to which land may be put is respected in the permits reported by the forest service for special projects on the national forests. Some of the uses shown range, alphabetically, from apiary to brickyard, cannery, cemetery, church, cranberry marsh, fox ranch, marine railway, rifle range, and turpentine still, to wharf and whaling station.

There are 15,000 permits in force for such special uses, which are distributed geographically from Alaska to the Mexican line, and east to Florida. This figure does not include any of the 27,000 permits in force for grazing cattle and sheep on the forests; nor the 6,000 transactions for the sale of timber, and the more than 38,000 permits issued last year for the free use of timber by settlers, miners, and others in developing their homesteads and claims; nor the nearly 300 permits for water powered development.

California led all the national forest states in the number of these special use permits, following by Arizona, Colorado, Montana, and New Mexico in the order named.
