TRACK WORK BEHIND TIME

RAIN HAS MADE TRAINING IMPOSSIBLE TO DATE.

Big Meet Near and Little Farm Has Been Attained by Men.

"Chuck" Reynolds, O. A. C. quartermaster and quarterback, and mentor of high school football last fall, has been assisting in the little drill of track and field apparatus that has been possible, due to an overflow of splatter from cloud circles. Up to this date, with the Eastern Oregon meet only less than a half month away, the team has had no consistent workouts, and no individual work at training has been attained. Consequently there is little to entice on the other hand, little to desert, for the student body has had little chance to get a line on the material. Union is not looking forward with much elation at the track projects for this year. Fireworks development must follow both at Union and here if either of the two schools grab the greatest number of points at Wallowa May 2.

University of Oregon students are anything but downcast over the defeat of their basketball team this winter, according to Gene Good, a U. of O. junior, who has been spending the week at home. "Baseball prospects are such that the student body is confident of cleaning up the colliate northwest this spring," said Mr. Good today.

"With the opening of the second semester the University of Oregon obtained, with the entrance of many new students, men who are going to make new Coast Records in the weight and distance runs when the track season gets in full swing. The athletic teams, including the base ball team are far better this year than ever before and the outlook for victories in these lines are better than they were this time last year. Not alone is the University of Oregon superior at these events but the scholastic records of all the students in college are better this year than in years previous due to the fact that the standard has been raised, and the flunkers have found it hard to keep up to the standard. All the La Grande boys are doing themselves proud and making records for themselves in whatever branch they have gone out for. Henry Heidebreich is throwing the discus farther this year than it has been thrown on the Pacific Coast yet and if he can do as well in the meets, he will put up a record that is hard to beat.

"For some time past there has been a feeling that the Fraternities at the University have been a bad thing in that they fostered cliques and an undemocratic feeling among the students but it took Coach Bezdek to take this feeling out of the students when he formed the inter-fraternity council and brought all the boys into the true feeling of friendship for each other and particularly for the University. This council is made up of men from each fraternity, have staged a few get together meetings and the feeling is now the true Oregon spirit. It has solved the problem which for some time appeared serious to the student body as well as the faculty."
