WILLOW RIVER

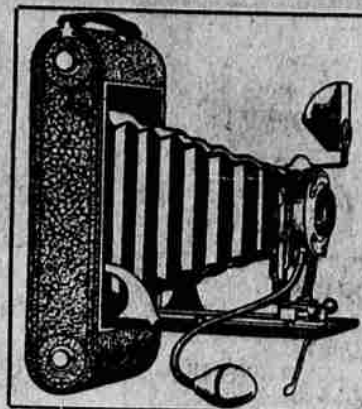

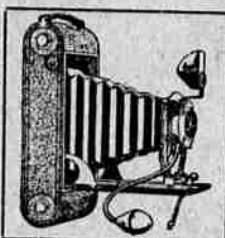
