

JOHN CORBETT FUNERAL HELD

From the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Shea, the funeral of the late John D. Corbett was held yesterday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. George Jenkins, daughter, Ruth and son Bert, were here from Baker to attend the funeral. Relative to the death of Mr. Corbett, a Baker paper says:

Death came to John D. Corbett, a pioneer resident of Baker county, at the home of George Jenkins on Resort street Friday evening after a long illness, suffering from a complication of troubles due to his advanced years, he being 88 years of age. He was born in Rossee, New York, July 22, 1836 and came west when a young man. He has lived in Baker county for a good many years, and was at Kamela for a long time. He recently went to Portland but returned here a short time ago and has been at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jenkins, ever since. Lucy Corbett, his wife, died April 1, 1899.

Mr. Corbett is survived by seven children, John Shea Corbett of La Grande, Mrs. Lillian Jenkins of Baker, Mrs. Mattie Daniel of Portland, Mrs. Agnes Crandall of La Grande, La Monte Corbett of Grants Pass, Mrs. Cora Crane of Seattle and Mrs. Jessie Hoffstaler of Seattle.
