CHILDREN UNDER 18 NOT ADMITTED TO IT.

Lecturer to Detail the Film as it is Run Off at Arcade.

If all the departments of social service perhaps none brings so little reward other than the consciousness of a good deed well performed than the work of rescuing young women from the clutches of the White Slave traffickers. In some instances the victims have become thoroughly imbued with the underworld taint and give little thanks for efforts in their behalf. Often a woman, little more than a human wreck, rises to the surface from the slimy maelstrom and asks only that her last days be made peaceful in an environment of cleanliness and respectability.

Both of these—and countless other tasks—have fallen to the lot of Clifford G. Roe until today he is perhaps the best hated individual the ranks of the white slavers know of. For years Mr. Roe fought with the forces of righteousness in Chicago until one day he had the satisfaction of seeing the terrible slum district at Twenty-second Street and Armour Avenue closed and "To Let" signs placed on a majority of the buildings. He has been the outcast's friend and many a mother's heart has been gladdened by the return of a missing daughter through the efforts of this young Knight of the Spotless Shield. His connection with the cleaning up

Logan Pays Balances.

Portland, to audit the books. In the meantime, the bonding companies who had furnished Mr. Logan's official bonds were notified. When Mr. Goudy finished auditing the books he found that Mr. Logan should pay to the

city, \$15,589.99; as the bonding companies had been notified, it was necessary to secure an agreement with them in connection with the settlement with the city. A three cornered fight developed. This finally reached a climax when Attorney Geo. T. Cochran for Mr. Logan and Attorney T. H. Crawford for the bonding company reached agreements and a tender of \$17,000 was made to the city. There was some differences over interest on the money that should have been turned over by Logan in February but the city conceded \$18 and the tender was accepted. The following are the amounts which go to make up the sum turned over to the city by Mr. Logan:

Principal sum\$15,589.99
 Bond coupons held up * 1,075.00
 Interest 335.01

The settlement, so far as the city was concerned, amounted to a payment of all the money due the city treasury according to Treasurer Mansager's audit of the books, together with payments made by the city by reason of the delay in settlement, and interest on the money in Mr. Logan's hands.

As soon as a settlement was made and accepted, receipts were executed and releases given Logan's bondsmen, the American Bonding company and the United States Fidelity & Guarantee company.

SEWER BIDS RECEIVED.

Portland Firm Is Lowest Bidder for Big Sewer Job.

The city commission last evening transacted a big bunch of detail business. Commissioners Russell and Gardner and President Wood were present. Among other important matters looked after, was the receiving of bids for the construction of sewer laterals between Depot and Fourth from the shops North to the alley between X and Y. The bidders were: Jefferies & Buffon of Portland, 78 cents per foot, Smith Construction company 80 cents, J. H. Childs, La Grande, 82; T. J. Wheelwright, La Grande, 84; E. L. Phelps, Weimer, 84;

Chas. W. Conner & Son, Stanfield, 87. The amount of the lowest bid was \$4,644.20. All bids but this one were rejected, and with the exact knowledge of the cost in hand, the commission can proceed to place the estimates and assessments without guessing. The details will be looked after as soon as possible that the work can be done with all possible haste.

Various means for cleaning up back assessments occupied much attention during the evening. Some settlements have already been made and more are under negotiations.

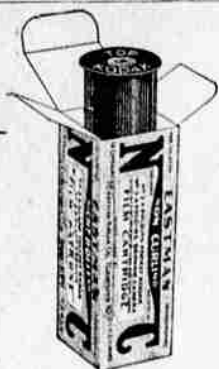
