PICTURES TONIGHT.

Tonight's moving picture show at the high school auditorium, and the lecture that goes with it, will prove a revelation to local sportsmen, say those who have seen it. W. L. Finley, "The Old Man of the Game Department" as he is known, has an interesting lot of lore to lecture on, and the pictures show a multitude of interesting things. It is free, and every sportsman or near-sportsman should see this film and become intimately acquainted with nature's provisions in Oregon for hunting and visions. Propagation of fish is one of the interesting things to which much attention is given by the film. The pictures commence at 7:30 and will last about a half hour. E. F. Averil, deputy game warden of Pendleton, is here in this connection and, having seen them, vouches for their worth.

That the new system of selling fish and hunting licenses is proving a pronounced success may be taken from the figures that are available at the county clerk's office. According to his records the number of licenses issued since the first of the year is in excess of the number of a similar period of last year by \$861.00. The number issued from January 1st 1913 to April 30th of that year was 457, and this year for the same period the number is 1,318.

"The difference in the number of sales will easily pay the salary of the deputy game warden for this district," says Mr. Lefel, "and will greatly reduce the number of illegal attempts to fish and hunt without the necessary license. And since the fish and game department of the state is entirely self-sustaining" not requiring a special appropriation from the general fund of the state, this ought to be an incentive for all sportsmen or near sportsmen to aid the deputy in every way, for it is going to mean more fish and better hunting. One man in Cove, two in Union, one in North Powder, Summerville, Imbler and Alcega respectively, two at Elgin, two in La Grande and the county clerk are authorized to sell these licenses.

BIG MATINEE RACES.

C. W. Todd has brought his string of harness horses to the La Grande track for training for the big matinee to be held here Saturday and Sunday May 30th and 31st. Todd's string consists of Bonnie Antrim, Aldine, Miss Locum, Granger, and a running-bred colt. Most of these horses are known to the local followers of turf favorites.
