

NEWS OF STATE'S INDUSTRY TOLD

RESUME OF ITEMS OF GENERAL INTEREST.

What Farmers and Merchants of the State Are Doing Told in Nutshell.

Salem, May 5.—During the past week two decisions have been rendered affecting industries. A federal court at Portland upheld the Oregon Blue Sky law, and the Supreme Court upheld the second suit brought by a working girl against the Minimum Wage law. Both will now be taken to the Supreme Court of the United States.

It is possible to utilize the wire grass that grows on Young's Bay near Astoria for manufacture of paper.

This week the manufacturers of Lane county will hold an exhibit of their products to encourage home industries.

The Dalles has bought 140 acres on the river front to give free sites for factories.

The Supreme Court has upheld the \$200,000 bond issue of Grant's Pass for the purpose of building a section of railroad to the coast.

To relieve unemployed, a bill has been initiated to tax all estates of \$50,000 or over ten per cent for a fund to be expended by a department of public works.

A special vessel has been chartered to carry 48 great Oregon logs to the

Panama Exposition for columns for the Oregon building.

The Toledo co-operative creamery is now in operation.

The Oregon Railroad Commission is examining the books and accounts of about fifty public utility corporations to ascertain their physical value and earnings.

Malheur county Pomona grange went on record as opposed to taxing mortgages, as tending to raise interest and keep capital out of Oregon.

Astoria has appointed an industrial commissioner to promote factories in the person of O. W. Taylor.

Molalla raised a bonus of \$2,000 for a pottery plant that is being erected and will soon be in operation.

A factory for the manufacture of lead pipe has been established at Portland, capable of making five thousand miles a year.

Gresham fruit growers are moving to establish a cannery.

It was stated at the Portland Rotary club that everyone with a fair reputation and a good pair of lungs could put over almost any kind of a freak measure in Oregon.

J. E. Tourtellotte, a Portland architect, submitted a plan for using fire-proofed wood building material for school houses at a saving of nearly fifty per cent over brick or stone.

Astoria has asked bids for the first unit of public docks to unite rail and water transportation.

Mayor Simpkins, of North Bend, has conducted an exhaustive investigation to ascertain the best paving material and decides in favor of vitrified brick or bitulithic.

North Powder has passed an ordinance to construct a gravity water system.

The proposed fifteen hundred dollar tax exemption would raise the

tax on industries fully twenty-five per cent in opinion of experts.

Cottage Grove is erecting a cannery to cost \$6,000.

The Clearwater Lumber Co., of Portland, is clearing the site for the erection of a big mill.

The Portland Timberman has issued a bulletin announcing that by its efforts it has just secured a reduction on lumber rates to fifty eastern cities.

The farmers around Burns have let a contract for erection of a co-operative meat packing plant.

The J. K. Armsly Fruit Co. is establishing a packing house at Roseburg.

The De Luse Mining and Dredging Co. has bought a large orchard at Gold Hill and will work the ground for placer gold.

Three candidates for governor and several other aspirants are baiting voters with initiative measures at their own expense.

The Geo. Moore Lumber Co. has secured 150,000,000 feet of timber on the Coquille river.

The Presbyterian Church of Eugene will be rebuilt of white pressed brick—Oregon made.

The Port of Coos Bay Commission will issue \$300,000 bonds to complete harbor improvements.

A pool of mohair sold at Cottage Grove for 27 1/2 cents this year that last year brought 34 cents. Last year the mohair mills at Portland had not suspended.

The Dornbecher Furniture Manufacturing Co. will build another two-story concrete addition to its plant at Portland.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: You are hereby notified that the Committee on estimates appointed by the Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, to make an examination of the property, upon which assessments are to be levied to pay the costs and expenses of the street improvement hereinafter described, as to the valuation and extent, if any of the benefits to be derived by said property by reason of said improvement, have made their report in writing to said council, which report has been received by said Commission and is on file in the office of the Recorder of said city, and is open for your inspection. That it is the intention of said Commission to levy a special assessment against all the property hereinafter described for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of improving South side of N Ave. from West curb line of Fourth Street to the East curb line of Oak Street by grading and placing thereon a standard 5 foot concrete sidewalk according to the plans and specifications therefore heretofore adopted by said Commission and on file in the office of the Recorder of said city.

That the real property included in and the boundaries of the district benefitted and affected by said proposed improvement are as follows: Beginning at a point on the intersection of the center line of Fourth Street with the center line of "N" Avenue the boundary line runs thence west along the center line of "N" Avenue to the center line of Oak Street, thence south along the center line of Oak Street 80 feet to a point opposite the south property line of Lot 12 in Block 3 Wisdom's Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon, thence east along the south property line of Lots 1 and 12 in Block 3 Wisdom's Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon, to the center line of Cedar Street; thence south along the center line of Cedar Street to a point opposite the center of Block 78 of Chaplin's Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon; thence east and through the center of Blocks 78, 77, 76 and 75 of said Chaplin's Addition to a point west 100 feet from the west property line of Fourth Street; thence north to the southwest corner of lot 5 in Block 75 in Chaplin's said Addition; thence east to the center line of Fourth Street; thence north to the place of beginning—all in the City of La Grande, Oregon, and the estimated cost of said proposed improvement is \$1,327.19. You will further take notice that said City Commission will meet at the Commission Chamber in the City Building of said city on the 13th day of May, 1914, at 7:30 o'clock P. M. of said day to consider making said proposed levy and will then and there grant a
