## SWEDEN BUYS MUCH FRUIT

GOOD MARKET FOR LOCAL STUFF, IF DEVELOPED.

How Exchanges Are Made, Told by American Consul.

The Export department of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, which is making a comprehensive study of the world markets for Northwestern apples and has collaterally secured information as to the consumption and importation into foreign countries of various kinds of fruit has ascertained that,

"The total importations of fruit and berries of all kinds into Sweden amount to approximately \$3,000,000 per annum, of which about 25 per cent enters through the port of Gothenburg. Fresh and dried fruit form the principal item of importation from the United States. The American Consul at Gothenburg informs us that the American apples sold in that market are known under these different names: California, Oregon and all others simply as American apples. The best qualities sold are Winesaps, Spitzenburg and Jonathans. The red apple is preferred, as green apples, with the exception of a few Oregon Newtowns cannot be sold there. Large apples are also not in demand. The medium and small sizes are preferred. The most popular size seems to be the 175s. Boxes are recommended for packing, as the apples arrive in better condition.

"At present fruit from the United States is largely purchased by Gothenburg importers through jobbers in Copenhagen, Hamburg, London, and Liverpool. The Consul informs us that American exporters insist upon cash against documents in New York, and even in San Francisco. The Gothenburg importers who are interested in making direct purchases are trying to secure a concession of payment of 80 per cent only against documents and 20 per cent upon arrival and inspection of the goods."
