

ENGINEER IS FOUND IN RIVER

FORMER SECRETARY TO SENATOR BOURNE IS FOUND.

Disappearance Is Still Deeply Veiled in Mystery.

Uortland, Ore., May 6.—Mystery surrounding the disappearance of Marshall C. Dudley, a mining engineer, who for twenty years was confidential agent to former Senator Bourne, was cleared when the decomposed body was found in the Willamette river at Oregon City. He disappeared February second. Whether he was murdered or committed suicide is not

known. Rocks were tied about his neck to keep him under water, and stones were also found in his pockets. No marks appeared to indicate that violence had been committed and the matter so far is a complete mystery.
