

GOLDEN WEDDING IS CELEBRATED

FORMER PRESBYTERIAN MINISTER HONORED.

Was for Many Years Pastor of Local Church and Was Well Liked.

Below is an excerpt from the Newburg Oregon Daily describing the events of the golden wedding of two persons well known to La Grande people. Mr. Ezra Hayes was for some years the Presbyterian minister



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in this city and was well liked. Former parishiners will read with pleasure the delightful happenings on the day of his golden wedding anniversary as recorded in his home paper. Says this paper:

One of the most successful and enjoyable events that has happened of late was the celebration of the golden wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Ezra Hayes at the I. O. O. F. hall on Tuesday.

The main hall was beautifully decorated with cythus, mahoniaaquifolia and cut flowers and ferns. The principal flowers and the decorations was an arch from which suspended a huge bell, all made of cythus. The dining room was profusely but tastefully decorated with bouquets of cut flowers and a spray of mahoniaaquifolia at each plate.

At high noon Mr. J. B. Hunt played the sweet strains of "The Bridal Chorus," from Lohengrin, and the bride and party marched into the hall.

The bride, accompanied by Mrs. Elizabeth Clemmens preceded by Mrs. E. E. Colton and followed by Mrs. Anna Marshall as color guards from the W. R. C., entered the hall from the right.

The groom, attended by Wm. Clemmens and guarded by the flag bearers, Mrs. Frances Woodruff and Mrs. G. E. Bennett, came through the door at the left. The bridal party met under the arch, the color guards being stationed two on either side.

The picture was complete when Rev. J. M. Dressler approached the happy couple from the center of the hall and stood in sober mein before them. The minister gave the form of the solemn rite he used fifty years ago, when he performed the marriage ceremony for "these two kids." Then in an impressive way they renewed the vows made 50 years ago and were repronounced man and wife by the minister, who had "made two hearts beat as one" so long ago.

Hearty congratulations followed, and one almost forgot that the hair of this worthy couple was growing gray when we noted the sparkle in the eyes of the groom and the modest blush of the bride, especially when N. E. Britt offered his congratulations.

Mr. Hunt then played a march and the assemblage repaired to the dining room, where 120 friends partook of a feast "fit for the gods."

Upon their return to the main hall,

the following program was rendered: Violin solo, by Miss Doris Gregory, accompanied by Miss Alice Christenson. This was a very pleasing number.

An original poem, "Golden Wedding Day," by Emma L. Langworthy, in which some of the principal events in the lives of the bride and groom were told.

Piano solo, by Miss Jessie E. Britt, rendered in her usual easy and agreeable way. She was very heartily applauded, but gracefully refused the encore.

Reading, "I Ain't Going to Cry Any More," by Miss Myrtle Hollingsworth. Those who have had the pleasure of hearing this reader will not be at all surprised to hear that she fairly "brought down the house." Her reading on this occasion was excellent.

Duet, "Put on Your Old Gray Bonnet," by Mrs. Zumwalt and Mrs. Sage. The song was very appropriate to the occasion.

Next was the presentation of the \$20 gold piece my Mrs. Mary A. Douglas. This was a material way in which the members of the W. R. C. and G. A. R. took of showing the love and esteem they have for Mr. and Mrs. Hayes. Mr. Hayes responded. He said he was very sure they both appreciated all that the friends were doing for them and thanked them for the gift. That he believed in "bestowing bouquets on the living," which, I believe, voiced the sentiments of all present.

J. B. Hunt then gave a piano solo, medley, which was heartily received. The program closed by all singing "America," led by Mrs. Zumwalt, with Mrs. Sage at the piano.

After spending a little time in social chat, the bride and groom went home, where a four-generation picture was taken and a reception tendered them by their M. E. church friends.

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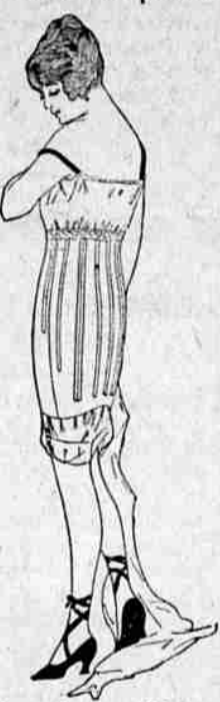
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
