

PILGRIMS' PROGRESS FILM

MOVING PICTURES OF FAMOUS BOOK COMING.

Film Story of John Bunyan to Be Shown at M. E. Church Thursday.

The most famous dream of modern times was that of John Bunyan, a poor English preacher, who, thrown into jail at Redford, England, 250 years ago on account of his religious zeal, saw in a vision a pilgrim toiling along Life's rough highway. In this dream the wanderer was searching for the happiness that with perfect living and good thoughts, but the way was long, leading as it did from the city of Destruction to the city of Everlasting Life by way of the River of Death. A presentation of this journey, which was set down in book form by the famous prisoner, will be given at the M. E. church on Thursday, May 14th.

People of all civilized lands have read this story, "The Pilgrim's Progress." It has been translated into more languages than any other book save the Bible, and, in spite of the bustle of modern life, it continues to be read and enjoyed. But now, that its story is told by the films, thousands of people, who have not had time to read the book, will know of Christian's struggle for righteousness.

ness, for one is able to get the complete work by seeing the pictures made by the Ambrosio Company, of Torino, Italy, and hearing the lecture by Colonel Ray, who explains the various scenes and events that are thrown upon the screen. This lecturer is well known throughout the United States, and he has spent much time in preparing for this presentation of Pilgrim's Progress.

Alexander Salvini, one of Italy's best known actors, plays the part of Christian, and Eleanor Sernanti portrays Christiana. Allaccio Giovanni takes the part of John Bunyan in the prologue, which pictures the life of the author. Bunyan wasted his substance in having a so-called "good time." Suddenly realizing that his family was in need and that his dissipation was the cause, he became a convert. The authorities placed him in jail to cool his growing zeal. It was here he dreamed the dream and saw the vision of the Pilgrim's Progress.

The pictures were shown recently in Portland, Tacoma and Seattle; over 37,000 spectators were present at the 78 performances given in these cities.
