

INSPECTION LAW WANTED

ELECTRICAL INSPECTOR TO BE CREATED HERE.

Commission Transacts Business Per- taining to City's Affairs.

Henceforth electric wiring in La Grande will be done under official supervision. An ordinance was introduced and read the second time at the weekly meeting of the commissioners last evening which prescribes what shall and what shall not be done in wiring buildings and residences. An electrical inspector is ordered and that duty will fall to the chief of the fire department. In this way the added office does not entail added payrolls. The ordinance will likely be passed at the next meeting.

Considerable business was transacted at the meeting last night. Bills were allowed and the May salaries for the resigned policemen were ordered paid.

The Y. M. C. A. was allowed to build stone steps from the sidewalk to its new building.

The street force foreman is to be known as superintendent hereafter, while the street work is heavy, but is not to have an office and is to be one of the workmen, having charge of the time sheets etc., for which he secures extra pay over common workmen.

Two petitions for water main extensions came in last night. One is for a four-inch main commencing on Cove Avenue running on Pennsylvania to North Balm and at the intersection with Pennsylvania and North Balm and at the intersection with Pennsylvania and North Balm is hydrant is asked for. The other is on Division from North Alder east approximately 300 feet. Both petitions were referred.

Earl Rankin presented objections to the assessments on his property in District 1, section 4.

The manager's report was read. It follows, setting out the financial situation of the library board.

The street superintendent has spent \$15.00 for repairs and \$134.50 for cleaning. The expense of cleaning up alleys etc., was \$87.50 and \$47.00 flushing streets, 65 loads of garbage were removed.

There was one fire call to E. C. Moore's house, occupied by Mrs. G. E. Moore. Damage considerable, to rear and roof by fire and whole house by water.

The Recorder collected \$3.15 from Jack Childs for grading over the sewer. \$3.00 for pound fees. One forfeiture \$5.00, collected \$31.65 on sewer between Adams and Washington Avenues, \$22.00 dog tax. Drew warrants for April salaries for \$1,492.55 for labor certificates. Refund to ladies of Catholic church of Dance License \$5.00. Drew warrants for \$112.45 on library fund on library

commission vouchers. Also \$50.00 on park fund, on voucher No. 1.

The Engineer set grades for sewer in Y. M. C. A. building. Also grade and line for Palmer, Rush, Wright, Andrews.

Wrote up two assessments on sewer, surveyed property and street line on Y and Third. Fence is in street by 17 feet. Verified location of farmer's line pole.

Water Superintendent spent \$24.00 repairing and overhauling meters, \$5.85 repairing hydrant, \$5.00 repairing leak, \$2.87 putting in a tap and \$20.41 lowering a main on Grandy Ave. where the neighbors excavated the street about a foot below sub-grade to secure fill for private lots.

The police arrested 18, released 15 with 3 in jail. Fines \$5.00, 2 horses and a colt in the pound. Also a dog. Mare and Colt are advertised and unless redeemed will be sold May 19.

Three undesirable women were given a chance to leave town. Arrested James Daley for robbing till in Queen restaurant and Edwin Howe for box-car robbery. Both are bound over to await action of the grand jury.

The treasurer collected \$1,018.94 for street assessments and \$22.30 interest on same. Collected \$939.40 water rents. Paid \$555.00 interest on Improvement bonds and \$311.68 for called warrants and interest thereon.

I recommend that the library board be asked to pay its assessments on the property. They can do this if not required to pay interest and I recommend that the interest be remitted.

I also recommend that the Park Board be allowed \$500.00 on its last year's contract. The proportionate amount of taxes collected to date would permit us to pay \$400.00 on this year's contract.

As we were delayed last year I recommend that \$250.00 to \$400.00 of this year's payment be made now.


