

WM. CRANDALL HOME BURNED

COMPLETE DESTRUCTION OF
FURNISHINGS COMES.

Remote Location from Hydrant and
Late Call Cause of Loss.

Fire early today destroyed the William Crandall home in South La Grande near the Mill creek canyon mouth, and practically all the furnishings and contents were a complete loss. Because the building was enveloped in flames before the blaze was discovered, and because the home is so remote from fire hydrants, the department was of little avail.

A defective flue is said to have been the approximate cause of the blaze. About 7 a. m. while Mrs. Crandall was getting things from the cellar and Mr. Crandall was at work in the barn, the fire got so much headway that it could not be controlled. The department made the run to the fire, only to find that it did not have enough hose to lead to the fire, the nearest plug being some

1500 feet away and located on the corner of C and Second streets.

Chemicals were used to save nearby buildings.

The house was a total loss, as was practically all of the furniture. Insurance to the amount of \$700 was carried on the house and but a small amount on the furniture. The loss, counting insurance, will be about \$3,000.

Mr. and Mrs. Crandall had just completed new cement walks and general repairs and improvements to their home.
