NORTH SIDE DELIVERY UP TO THE PEOPLE.

Postoffice Inspector Outlines Requirements for Carrier.

C. W. Linebaugh, post office inspector, left yesterday for points in southern Oregon, where he will remain until the middle of next month. On his return trip he will make an inspection of the sidewalk improvement suggested by him, relating to the demand for an additional mail carrier for parts of the mill district, that have no mail service by carrier.

In speaking of the matter this morning the postmaster, E. E. Bragg, informed a reporter, that the whole matter now hinges on the willingness of the residents of the district to make the improvements suggested by the post office inspector.

The improvements that were outlined by him, including the building of new sidewalks, and the repairing of old ones, the placing of numbers on the houses, construction of crossings and the placing of street signs on the corners. Part of this work will be done by the city. The city manager has stated that the city would make the necessary crossings, and repair sidewalks where it properly had to, and likewise place the street signs.

The matter will be inspected thoroughly by the city officials and property owners will be required to make improvements along their property at their own cost if the work is done. Where difficulty arises in this matter some sort of satisfactory agreement will be reached between the city and the property owners, because the making of the improvements is absolutely necessary before the post-office department will put on a new man.

If the improvements are made and an additional man is placed on the mail carrier's list, it will give the resident section of the city two daily deliveries instead of one. Some improvements will have to go through the regular routine course of ordinances, and for this reason, cannot be made in the course of one month, but it is thought the prospective improvements will satisfy the inspector and carry forth a recommendation on his part to put on the additional man.

Ordinance No. 770, Series 1914.
AN ORDINANCE to regulate and license the conducting of public dance halls, ball rooms and dancing academies, and to prohibit and restrain any immoral or indecent dances, and define what constitutes the same, and provide a penalty for the violation of the provisions hereto.

THE CITY OF LA GRANDE, OREGON, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1.—Before any person or persons shall conduct, carry on, or engage in conducting, keeping or maintaining any public dance hall, dancing academy, or place where dancing is regularly carried on, or indulged in for hire or profit, he or they shall first obtain a license from the City Recorder of this city and pay to the Treasurer of said city the sum of \$100.00, annually, payable semi-annually.

Section 2.—Any room or place where dancing is regularly carried on or conducted or which is leased, let or rented for hire, or an admission fee is charged for attending any dance therein, either as a participant or spectator, shall for the provision of this Ordinance be deemed a public dance hall; and any room or place where dancing lessons or instructions in dancing shall be given for hire or any money or stipend received therefor, shall be deemed a dancing academy.

Section 3.—Any person or persons who shall organize, promote or conduct any dance or ball for profit, or who shall charge or receive any admission fee for attendance at such dance or ball, either for participants or spectators, or shall sell any ticket for the same, shall first obtain a license from the City Recorder and pay in the City Treasury of the City

of La Grande, Oregon, for each of such dances or balls, the sum of \$5.00.

Section 4.—Any rag dance or dances which in their nature have an immoral or lewd tendency, or are offensive to common decency, are prohibited, and all persons promoting or allowing, or engaging in such dance or dances shall be deemed guilty of violating this ordinance.

Section 5.—No intoxicating liquors or beverages shall be sold, given away used or drunk in a room, or carried into a room, where dancing is being held or conducted.

Section 6.—No person conducting, managing, promoting or receiving pay for admission to any dance or ball shall issue any pass to, or allow any person who leaves the hall, re-admission without his or her paying the regular admission fee.

Section 7.—Any person violating any of the foregoing provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, in the municipal court, be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00, and in default of payment of such fine, shall be imprisoned in the city jail one day for every \$2.00 of such fine unpaid.

This Ordinance shall go into effect on and after 30 days from its passage and approval, to-wit: on and after the 18th day of April, 1914.

Passed by the Commission of the City of La Grande, on this the 18th day of March, 1914, by three Commissioners voting therefor.
