Stephenson and Harvard Expeditions Told—Road Routes Shown.

Stephenson's expedition into the arctic region and his discovery of the blonde eskimo and the Harvard museum expedition into Siberia, were shown this afternoon with lectures at the Arcade and will be shown again tonight.
