Contract Let For Water Ditch.

Very little business was transacted at the adjourned meeting of the council last Saturday night. The petition of the business men for a night marshal was laid on the table, the ordinance regulating stock breeding was given its final reading and was passed, and the matter of extending the pipe line to the west part of town was considered. This was finally decided upon and the water committee

instructed to get bids on the work of digging and filling in 600 feet of ditch 26 inches deep and a foot wide at the bottom. There were five bidders, the bid of Lee Morelock of 11 1/2

per foot being the lowest. Work was started at once, and there should be a supply of water for the people of this section in the very near future. —Elgin Recorder.
