Gunner Peterson, a former La Grande man who is now Pendleton's premier third sacker and who is working behind the bat owing to the injury to George Pembroke, has displaced Earl Sheely of Walla Walla as leading hitter of the Western Tri-state league and he took his lead off the Bear pitchers. Last week he batted .481 giving him an average for the season of .390. Against the Buck twirlers Sheely dropped to .343.

MOTORCYCLES WILL COMPETE

ANNUAL RUN TO BE HELD IN
JUNE

Big Entry List Assured—Motor and
Automobile News.

La Grande's second annual motorcycle marathon to Baker and return will be held June 21. The local motor fraternity is going to put the event on this year, and have plans and specifications, as it were, pretty well in hand. The immense popularity of the scheme last year insures a tremendous success for the run this year, and Portland and Spokane riders are displaying a great deal of interest in it.

"We are assured of a very large list of starters," said Roscoe Neal, a prominent worker in the scheme, today. "The date set should see a good roadway, and it will not be oppressively hot at that time, either."

Motorcycle riders of the city expect to form a club in the near future, in fact before the big run is put on. The fraternity is a large one now and justifies organization similar to that under which the auto owners work.

On a basis of population California leads any section of the United States in the ownership of automobiles. The latest figures, compiled under the new automobile law, show that in this state one person in every 27 is the owner of a motor car. In New York State only one person in every 89 is the owner of an automobile. The figures which establish the lead of California in auto ownership are for motor cars that are actually in commission, with no duplications and are taken from the registration, which to date shows 94,718 cars in the state.

SPORT GOSSIP.

The student body of the University of Oregon has conferred a distinction on a La Grande student in the state institution—Henry Heidenrich. Mr. Heidenrich has been named a member of the student body athletic council, a position that is both responsible and honorary. Mr. Heidenrich's general popularity on the campus, and his efficient work with the weights in the track team, won for him the signal honor annually falling to three men of the university. Tom Boylen, well known here, hailing from Pendleton, has been named student body president. His candidacy was assured of success when he beat Johnny Baker of O. A. C. in the 220 a week ago Friday.

Pendleton Day at Caledonian Picnic in Athena may see the revival of the popular sport of horse racing which commanded as much enthusiasm and attention back in the nineties as baseball does now.

The coming race matinee, which is but a few days off, is one of the big amusement numbers anxiously looked forward to. It is promised that Union stock show strings will be here, and of course the several good strings now in training on the local track will participate. It should be a mid-summer form show of speed.

The Union horse show, coming early in June, indicates that it will be an even greater success this year than ever. A tour of Union and Wallowa counties recently completed—this week in fact—reveals to the Union boosters that the attendance will be even greater than it has been at any time in the past. The association is prepared for a big display of stock, and the races promise to excel anything ever seen there in the past.
