CABBAGE TOO IS HIGHER BY A CENT PER POUND.

New Potatoes Have Tendency Toward Decrease—Market News.

Sugar is 20 cents higher than it was four days ago. A fifteen cent raise the middle of last week was followed by a five cent increase, and cane sugar is now \$5.20 per cental, cash price. New potatoes are inclined downward, selling for three pounds for a quarter. New cabbage is higher, commanding 6 cents instead of five.
