Captain McInnis of the visiting team offered to mediate by playing the game over but as this was not listened to it is now up to President Lincoln to settle the whole proposition.

North Powder had scored on errors principally, only three bingles being registered off McInnis. Pierson let La Grande down with five hits for the eight innings.

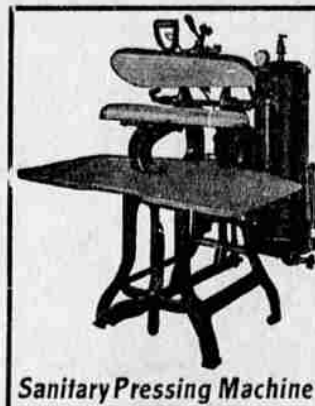
