

DON M'LACHLIN ANSWERS CALL

DEATH COMES AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS.

Funeral to Be Held from the Home Tomorrow Afternoon at 2 O'clock.

Donald A. McLachlin aged 37, died last midnight after an illness of less than a month brought about by hardening of arteries. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the J. H. McLachlin home, 1803 Third street. His life has been spared of for several days and the end came about midnight last night. His son Archie was called from Portland, and his near relations were assembled in the home of his father, J. H. McLachlin when the end came. The relatives surviving are the father, ex-chief of police and mother, one daughter, Florence Donohue, Archie, a son, a sister Helen, and an uncle Archie McLachlin.

Don McLachlin was born in Caledonia, near Rochester, N. Y., in 1877 and when 10 years old came to the West with his parents. They lived at Sprague, Wash., for a year and then came to La Grande, where they have lived to date. While here Mr. McLachlin was a member of the volunteer fire department for many

years, and attained statewide renown as a billiard and pool player. He was a painter by trade.

Sound in a Fog.
It has often been noticed that on wet and foggy days sounds are heard at a greater distance than on clear fine days. It was Tyndall who explained the reason for this. He noticed that the distance at which the sounds of foghorns, whistles and shots could be heard varied from day to day from two to twelve miles. The cause of this difference is found in the degree of homogeneity of the air. On a foggy or snowy day the air may be perfectly homogeneous; this permits sound to travel a great distance. In clear weather the air may be composed of vertical layers of differing consistency, and the sound waves are reflected from the surfaces of the layers. Probably they are also refracted in passing through the several layers. Currents of warm ascending air form in one place and currents of cold descending air form in others. Thus the atmosphere may be very transparent optically and very opaque acoustically.—New York World.
