

EXILE TELLS ODD STORIES

COUNT WILL RECITE OUTRAGES
AT CHAUTAUQUA.

Fine Speech Expected From Count
Lochwitzky Next July.

The stories of the terrible treatment of exiles sent to inhospitable Siberia and to bleak Saghalien Island, for offenses trifling or wholly imaginary, are not new, but not before have stories of human suffering almost passing belief been brought to free America by a Russian of noble birth, who has had a high official position in Russian War Office, and is therefore in position to speak of the oppressive bureaucracy of Russia from a personal knowledge of all its intricate workings.

RUSSIAN EXILE, COUNT SLO-
WIZKY.



Late Lieutenant-Colonel and Chief of Bureau of Russian War Office, will tell these stories to patrons of the Grande Ronde chautauqua at Riverside park this year.

In May, 11897, the Colonel was arrested as a "suspect" belonging to a "Socialist party," and on the technical charge of founding a free school, a school in which the peasants could have the advantages of a common education for their children without the interference of the priests of the Greek church, he was thrown into the dungeon of the Fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul at St. Petersburg, held for fifteen months in solitary seclusion, denied any knowledge of his family, his large estate confiscated, tortured to make him confess things he had never dreamed of doing, divorced from his wife, and was, without trial, sent as a "political exile," guilty of "high treason," to "hard labor" for four years on the Island of Saghalien, Siberia, by the ukase of the Czar Nicholas II. After that he had to remain twelve years in exile in Siberia, but after one and one-half years spent at Vladivostok, where he was secretary of the British Vice-Consulate, Colonel Lochwitzky escaped to Japan, thence to China and finally to the United States, in 1904.

Astoria is to get a streetcar line extension of two miles at the hands of the Pacific Power and Light Company.

The Malheur Enterprise say there will be general approval of the members of the legislature who put in their time swatting fool laws.

Astoria will spend \$280,000 this year on a seawall, and fill in fifty blocks of city property for factories and business.

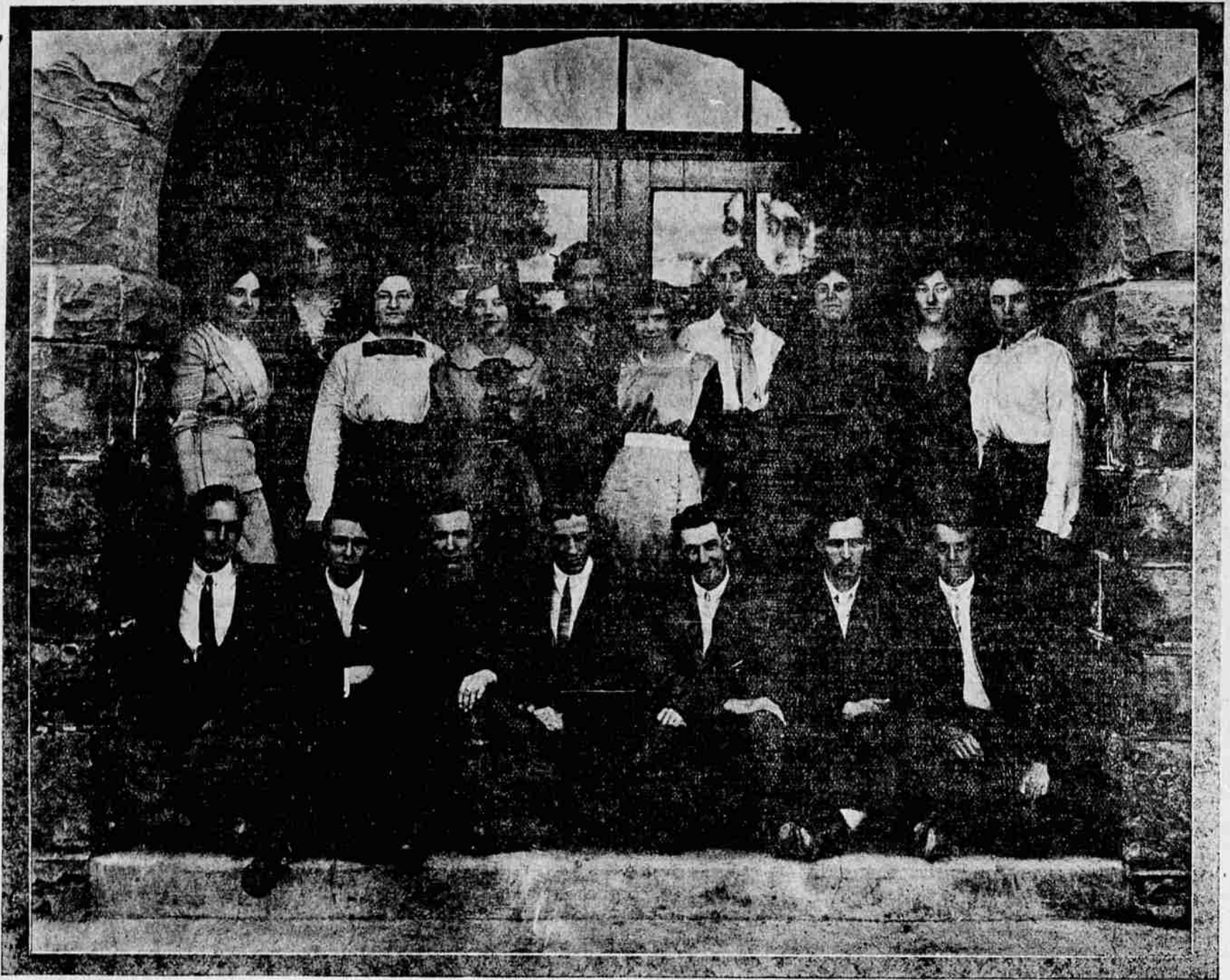
Coos Bay lumber shipments to San Francisco for the last two weeks of April surpassed all other on the coast—\$40,000 feet.

Umatilla Republicans Organize.

Pendleton, May 22.—(Frank S. Curl of this city, whose voting precinct is No. 19 (North Reservation), is the new chairman of the Umatilla County Republican Central committee, having been chosen to that position unanimously last evening at the meeting of the committeemen held in the court house. Major Lee Moorhouse of this city is secretary, defeating F. G. Rogers and Robert Brown for the office, Asa B. Thomson of Echo, retiring chairman, is a member from this county of the state central committee and Thomas Thompson of this city is member of the state congressional committee.

All but ten members of the committee were present in person or by proxy. It appearing that eight of the precincts did not elect committeemen, the chairman was instructed to fill the vacancies. The chairman was also instructed to appoint an executive board of six members with himself at the head. Chairman-elect Curl made a short speech upon taking the chair, outlining his plans and expressing the hope that the entire Republican ticket would be elected. His words were received with enthusiasm.
