RATE CASE IS PUT IN COURT

RAILROAD COMMISSION CASE TO BE TRIED HERE.

Demurrer, First Step, Is to Be Argued Here This Week.

Judge Knowles has set for hearing here late this week the demurrer of the Railroad Commission of Oregon in the suit filed by the Eastern Oregon Co-Operative Telephone Association, of Elgin, to set aside and annul the recent order of the Railroad Commission requiring the Co-Operative Telephone Company to make physical connections at Elgin, Cove and Summerville between its lines and the long distance lines of the Home Telephone Company and requiring both companies to interchange business at those places after the connection should be made. The order of the Commission required the connection to be made within 20 days from the date of the order; but the connection was not made and sometime after the expiration of the 20 days, the present suit was filed in the Circuit-Court of Union County to annul the order. No injunction was asked for at the time and the order has not been complied with. Attorney General A. M. Crawford, appearing for the Railroad Commission, filed a demurrer to the complaint in the suit which had been filed by L. Denham, of Elgin, and J. D. Slater, of this city.

Judge Knowles will hear the demurrer this week, as stated, and the case will probably be one of the first civil cases to be disposed of at the June term, in the event that the case is not disposed of upon the demurrer, in as much as it is said the statute requires suits to set aside the orders of the Railroad Commission shall have precedence over all civil matters both in the Circuit and Supreme courts.

It is understood that the delay in taking up the case for early hearing has been largely due to a tactic understanding by all parties that it would be profitable to await the decision of the Federal Judges in the telephone case at Portland, known as the "Oregon Hotel Case," in which the principal points involved were the power and authority of the Oregon Railroad Commission to require telephone companies to connect and interchange business. Recently, the Federal Judges unanimously decided in favor of the Railroad Commission upon all the points involved.

PENDLETON MAN HURT.

Escape from Death in Auto Accident Is Held to Be Narrow.

Pendleton, May 23.—But for the almost superhuman efforts of Omar Stevens and John Vaughan, Wesley N. Matlock, whose automobile turned turtle Thursday afternoon near Wasco, would undoubtedly have been crushed to death, according to the story brought back by G. I. La Dow and W. C. E. Pruitt, members of the party. The machine fell across Matlock and settled on his chest, and was slowly crushing the life out of him when Vaughan and Stevens, exerting their last ounce of strength, raised the two ton Cadillac enough to permit the pinioned man to crawl from beneath.

F. E. (Jack) Welch was injured worse than the first reports indicated. He was brought back last night and will be confined to his home for some time with a badly strained hip. The physician thinks it is possible that the hip bone was cracked. Matlock's nose was broken and he received severe bruises. He will remain in Wasco for several days.

The accident occurred just before the John Day grade was reached, about 12 miles this side of Wasco and was caused by a reverse turn in the road. In making the first turn, the sandy road required the front wheels to be turned at a greater angle than if the road had been hard. The reverse turn being directly ahead, the driver could not turn the steering wheel quite fast enough to make it. The result was that one wheel struck the embankment and turned the car turtle in the middle of the road. Stevens and Welch were caught under the car. Welch being unable to move because of his injured hip, Stevens was the only one able to render assistance. Vaughan was caught only by one foot and was soon liberated. Both men believed that Matlock had been killed until they heard his voice calling faintly: "You'll have to life it off quick or I'm gone," he said, and the two men put every atom of strength they had into a desperate effort. They lifted it enough to enable Matlock to crawl out. He collapsed at once. The broken nose caused him to bleed at the mouth and this with his labored respiration led to a fear of internal injuries.

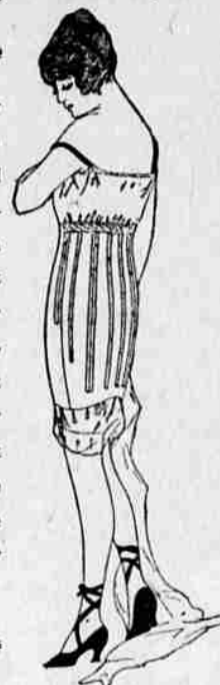
