Relative of Julius Roesch of La Grande Hurries far to Bedside.

Pendleton, May 25.—In a race with death from half way round the globe Ensign Herbert Roesch, U. S. N., is rushing across the Pacific in hopes of arriving in Pendleton before his father, William Roesch, is called to the great beyond. The dying man is a brother of Julius Roesch of La Grande. He is expected here by June 5 and it is an open question whether he will reach here in time to find his parent alive. Mr. Roesch is very low and his life has almost been despaired of. However, he is very anxious to see his son again and this fact may keep the sick man alive despite his serious condition.

At the time his father's illness became alarming Ensign Roesch was on the gunboat Helena at Shanghai, China. In order to secure a speedy leave of absence the service of Governor West was enlisted and by taking the matter up with the navy department the matter was expedited. But it is a long trip from Shanghai to Pendleton and it will be 10 days yet before the son can reach home.

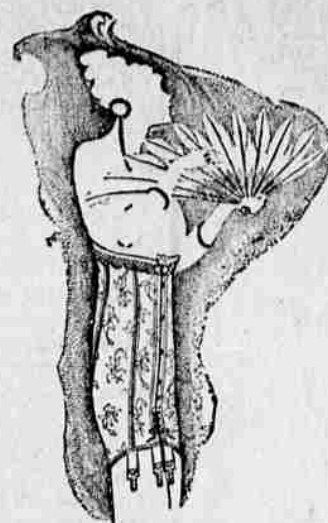
