MEAT TRADE IS NOT BRISK

SMALL QUANTITIES COME FORWARD AT PORTLAND.

Prices Hold Firm—General Conditions Unchanged This Week.

Portland, May 27.—(Special)—There was little change in general conditions in the livestock trade at North Portland yesterday. The run was only four cars. The only hogs that came forward were from Montana and none of these were of suitable quality to bring \$8.25, the extreme figure of the day before. Better stuff would have likely brought the top.

At Chicago there was no change in the general swine trade and prices were steady.

But one lone "beef" entered the yards over night and came from Sweet Grass, Mont., in a car of hogs. Nevertheless the trade is not suffering for supplies and some left over stuff from yesterday was sold this morning.

NEW ADJUNCT TO O.-W. SHOP

WELDING FACILITIES IMPROVED RECENTLY.

Flue Welding Department Moves Into Bigger Quarters.

The addition to the round house machine shop intended as a shop in which to weld steel ends to flues, is now occupied and is in all respects complete. Heretofore this essential of work had to be done elsewhere entailing a loss of time and money.

Small sections of steel pipe about six inches in length are affixed to the end of the pipe which is then inserted into an oil heating furnace and there brought to welding heat. When this has been done and the proper heat has been developed, the jointed sections are placed in a power roller and welded together by heavy pressure. The pipe is then tested to see whether it will hold water. The pressure is somewhere 100 pounds, and if the joint is found leaky, goes back for another process of welding.

Old pipes are used for this purpose. They are first put through a machine which grinds off all the lime and other deposits which accumulate on them while in the boiler. When this has been done the pipe is practically as good as new, thus causing a great saving to the company.

The great lifting crane which the company installed about a month ago is about ready for operation. Some slight details have to be altered which, as soon as they are made will give the shop the most up-to-date piece of machinery known to mechanics. It is capable of lifting an entire engine thus doing away with an enormous lot of jacking and blocking.
