When they settled here there was not even a postoffice where the town of Wallowa now stands, and the nearest trading point was in the Grande Ronde valley.

Hester A. Asher was born October 6th, 1836 at Martinsville, Morgan county, Indiana, and spent several years of her early life in that place and in Bloomington, Monroe county, of the same state. She was married at Martinsville in 1854 to William L. Palmer and they then moved to Bloomington until 1883 when they crossed the plains with a large emigrant caravan, arriving at Fort Walla, Walla, Wash., in the fall of the year. For two years they lived in Washington, and came to this county in 1885.

Four years later—on July 27, 1889 the husband, William L. Palmer died, and the body was interred in the Lower Valley cemetery. Eight children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Palmer, three of whom, Alice, Elizabeth and Emma, died in the East. Five children are still living, and are: W. W. Palmer of Bossburg, Wash., Jennie Rogers of San Diego, Cal., G. R. Palmer of Wallowa, Jas. M. Palmer of Parma, Idaho, and Mrs. Alma Anderson of Wallowa. It was at the home of the latter that Mrs. Palmer passed away.

There are fifteen grandchildren and one great grandchild. Earl Rogers was the only one of the grandchildren to be present at the funeral. Mrs. Palmer was ill just nine weeks, and her death was due to a complication of diseases.

The funeral was held Saturday afternoon at the Christian church.

Wallowa Pioneer Dead.

Another pioneer of the Wallowa valley died last Thursday when Mrs. Hester A. Palmer passed away, death occurring about one o'clock in the afternoon. Mrs. Palmer was nearly 79 years old, as her 79th birthday would have occurred on October 6.

Mr. and Mrs. Palmer moved to this valley in 1885 settling on a homestead eight miles north of town. There were few white people in the county when they arrived here, and there was little to welcome them except an abundance of nature and a few bands of Indians. However, the sturdy nature and grim determination of the pioneer prevailed, and they settled here to make their home and
