SPORTSMEN TO FISH JULY 19

TENTATIVELY, THAT DATE HAS BEEN SET.

Big Event to Draw Members of Wing, Fin & Fleetfoot Club.

Officers of the Wing, Fin & Fleetfoot club are discussing Sunday July 19 as the probable date for the big fishing day. If the 19th is chosen, which seems likely, because streams will be down and roads as good then as they will ever be, the clubmen will hie to the streams of Eastern Oregon to fish, with prizes hung up for the winners for the day. These matters were discussed at the meeting of the directors this week. In addition to talking over the proposed fish day, the directors placed crowns on a par with mag pies, for which there is a \$10 prize for the club member who kills and presents to Secretary Wenzel the greatest number of mag pie carcasses during the year. By the new arrangement, crowns will count equally with mag pies.

New members were taken in at the meeting this week, and in a general way the affairs of the association were gone over.

The Enterprise Record Chieftain throws some interesting light on the Minam dam question not announced locally, and incidentally harpoons Union county sportsmen with the following:

The state fish and game commission has notified J. H. Jackson, county game warden, that it has formally decided to blow up the hatchery dam in the Wallowa river. No notice to this effect was received a few days ago by Mr. Jackson, from R. E. Clanton, master fish warden.

The commission, it appears, instructed Mr. Clanton to proceed and destroy the dam by blowing out all or part, enough to give an open passage for all fish. Mr. Clanton wrote for Mr. Jacob's help. Mr. Jackson in turn passed the word along to members of the committee which recently met at the dam and later at Wallowa to give voice to Wallowa county's wishes in regard to the future of the dam. The committee consisted of W. Al Jones of Joseph, W. C. Hinterman of Enterprise and F. T. Baker of Wallowa.

One or two of these men started an agitation to appear to the commission to have the dam blown out at once. Mr. Clanton having stated that he would be busy at the hatcheries for the next two or three weeks. If this appeal produces no results, the dam will have to wait until Mr. Clanton gets ready to tackle the job. The desire to have the obstruction removed from the river is so strong that the state board will have to have good reasons to delay.

Nearly everybody in Wallowa county goes fishing at one time or another. Before the dam was put in the salmon and certain kinds of trout came up into these mountain streams to spawn. The creeks and rivers and lakes were alive with these migratory fish in season. All this came to an abrupt stop, of

last Sunday. The clubbers have taken a new lease on baseball life and have cast all their miscue baskets to discard and will get down to hard tacks within the league circuit.

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course, when the dam was placed across the river.

With the removal of the obstruction it is expected the fish again will come into the waters of the valley from the large rivers below. This should make fishing decidedly more varied and productive of better filled baskets.

The only objection to removal of the dam has come from Union county. Union county sportsmen want to keep Wallowa county closed to the migratory fish, so that all will go their way.

Speaking of the formation of gun clubs in Baker county, the Baker Herald says:

W. E. Leffel, fish and game warden of Baker and Union counties, returned this morning from the Panhandle where he organized rod and gun clubs at Cornucopia and Halfway. At Cornucopia there are 60 members and at Halfway there were 30 at the organization meeting and more to be enrolled shortly. Mr. Leffel will return to Richland in a few weeks to organize a club there and to make arrangements with the farmers to screen their irrigation ditches. He found that the fish have been getting through the irrigation headgates and have been destroyed in large numbers by being floated over the alfalfa fields.

Arrangements will be made by him at once to take a carload of trout fry to Robinette and from there to distribute the small fish through the Panhandle streams.
