

EXPENSE FILED BY CANDIDATES

TEN CENTS IS SMALLEST ITEM
OF ANY OF THEM.

One Precinct Committeeman Files
Account of Fifty-five Cents.

A total of \$280.92 was spent for campaign expenses by candidates running for county and precinct offices. Precinct offices just happen to get attention by 55 cents worth, and but for this, would not be named. Precinct Committeeman McRae of Sumnerville spent the sum of 55 cents, five cents of which was for postage and 50 cents for notary fees.

In the certificates of campaign expenses, which have to be filed with the county clerk by candidates for county offices, a large number of items have been included in the account which according to Attorney General Crawford are not required to be stated. At least this is the conclusion based on an opinion given some years ago by the attorney general immediately after this law went into effect.

According to this opinion newspaper articles, traveling expenses, hotel bills and ordinary living expenses need not be stated in the certificate of campaign expenses. If this had been followed, the total for all the candidates would have been considerably under \$100. In only one instance is there mention of an item for campaigner's expenses.

It must also be borne in mind that this list does not include district judges, candidates for the lower and upper houses of the state legislature or any office that is of state and not county caliber. The following list will show what each man spent:

Indian Skeleton Found Under City

ELGIN EXCAVATORS UNEARTH
BONES AND TRINKETS.

Sixth Corpse Under One Building Located at Elgin.

Encased in a decayed buffalo robe, the remains of an Indian have been dug up by excavators building an addition to the City Drug store, owned by F. E. Harris of Elgin. The discovery proves conclusively that the building stands upon an Indian burial ground for this is the sixth skeleton to be found within a few feet of where the bones were found this week. In 1896 four graves were unearthed by the excavators when the drug store building was erected; shortly afterwards sewer diggers found the fifth, and Tuesday the sixth came to light when an addition was desired to the building.

These particular bones indicate clearly that the brave had been laid away with Indian ceremonial because trinkets and tools such as follow Indians to their graves, were found along side the remains. Chief among these was a long chain of copper thimbles.

Elgin pioneers believe that the corpses were of warriors slain in the last skirmishes with the Walla Walla regulars along about 1852 or they may be a portion of Chief Joseph's band, dead because of natural results. It is pointed out that it would be unlikely that warriors slain in battle wherein history asserts the foes were victorious, would be given "decent" burial. The bones have been reinterred and the trinkets are held by Elgin people who found them.

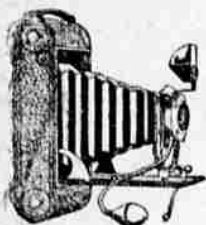
