Spring athletics brought their rewards to Lee Reynolds, local student at O. A. C. As the crowning event to a season which commenced with a record holding race for him, came his election to the captaincy of the O. A. C. track team for next year.

He lowered the indoor collegiate record at the Columbia meet early in the season and ever since has been deemed the premier half miller in the collegiate Northwest. He gained this distinction through consistent victories and his indoor mark which will no doubt stand for some little time. His defeat at Pullman by Nelson and Clyde is not to his belittlement for he left Nelson at the Oregon meet after a hard spurt. He has it over Clyde, all who have seen the men run, admit his showing at the Berkeley meet also brought him fame.

His election to the captaincy of the next year's track team, is all the more meritorious because of the men who might have been given the honor. Kaddlerly, Lafky, Hapgood and a half dozen other popular O. A. C. letter men were breasted by the little half miller in the captaincy race.

Reynolds is home from Corvallis for the summer and expects to keep his leg muscles in a well-oiled condition by laboring upon his father's farm, where, by the way, he developed that wonderful staying powers and endurance which has made of him a record holder. Next year Hapgood will be able to participate in collegiate events and he and Reynolds will, barring the unforeseen, very probably take every race beyond the quarter. Reynolds is a Kappa Sigma Nu member, and well liked and popular on the campus and stands well in his academic work.

Ordinance No. 774, Series 1914.

An ordinance to create the office and defining the duties of Electrical Inspector, in the City of La Grande, Oregon; and to regulate the electrical wiring in buildings and structures within the limits of said City; and to license persons, firms or corporations engaged in electrical wiring; and to provide penalties for the violation of the same.

The City of La Grande does ordain as follows:

Section 1.—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation to introduce or place any electric light, heating or power wire, circuit or circuits or electrical apparatus in or on any building, awning, structure or addition thereof within the corporate limits of the City of La Grande, Oregon, unless the same shall be in conformity with the rules and regulations set forth in what is known as "The National Electrical Code," being the rules and regulations for the installation of electrical wiring, and apparatus for electric lights, heat and power, as the same are now established, together with any amendments and changes made from time to time and hereby adopted and approved. Before any such electrical wiring shall be commenced in or on any building, awning structure or addition thereto, a written permit must be obtained from the Electrical Inspector of said City, authorizing the person or persons, firm or corporation therein named to do and perform said electrical wiring and designate location where the same is to be performed.

No electrical wiring shall be com-

menced hereafter as aforesaid unless such permit has been obtained. Such permit shall be issued by the Electrical Inspector of said City, and before such permit shall be issued, such person or persons shall pay into the City Treasury the sum of fifty (50c) cents, for each permit, and exhibit the receipt therefor from the City Treasurer to the Electrical Inspector.

Section 2. After an electrical wiring shall have been completed in or on any building, awning, structure or addition thereto, for which a permit has been issued, the person or persons, firm or corporation who performed the same must immediately notify the Electrical Inspector of the completion of the work, and must keep said work open for inspection by and until he shall have examined and approved the same, and issued a certificate of such inspection. It shall be the duty of the Electrical Inspector, upon receiving said notice, to inspect said electrical wiring, and if the same has been performed in accordance with the rules and regulations set forth in the National Electrical Code, as herein and before mentioned, he must issue a certificate to such effect, and deliver the same to the person or persons, firm or corporation having done said wiring; but if not performed in accordance with the said rules and requirements, he shall withhold such certificate until all defects are remedied.

Section 3. The Electrical Inspector shall have the right to enter into all buildings where electric current wire exists for the purpose of inspecting the same.

Section 4. The said Electrical Inspector is hereby empowered to inspect or re-inspect all wiring in or on buildings and apparatus conducting electric current for light, heat and power, and when said conductors or apparatus are found to be unsafe to life or property, he shall notify the person, or persons, firm or corporation, using or operating them to place the same in a safe and secure condition within forty-eight (48) hours. Any person or corporation failing or refusing to repair, change or remove same within Forty-Eight (48) hours, or within such further time as the Electrical Inspector deems necessary, after receipt of such notice, shall be subject to the penalty hereinafter provided.

Section 5. All additional installations, changes, alterations, extensions, or repairs to existing electric installations made previous to the adoption of this ordinance, shall be done in accordance with the hereinbefore mentioned rules of the said National Electrical Code. In all new installations of wires inside of the fire limits of said City, the wires shall be placed in conduits.

Section 6. There is hereby created the office of Electrical Inspector, which said office shall be filled ex-officio by the Chief of the Fire Department.

Section 7. All electricians or other persons, firms or corporations shall, before engaging in the business or work of wiring or placing their electrical apparatus in buildings for hire, shall first pay into the City Treasurer the sum of Twenty (\$20.00) dollars a year for each year or fraction thereof they may hereafter follow such occupation, and receive a license from the City Recorder, under the seal of said City.

Section 8. Any person or persons, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall upon conviction thereof the municipal court, be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty (50.00) dollars or by imprisonment in the city jail of the City of La Grande not exceeding Twenty-five (25) days, or in default in paying such fine as may be imposed, One (1) day imprisonment in said City Jail for every Two (\$2.00) dollars.

Section 9. All ordinances or parts or ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 10. This ordinance being deemed of paramount importance and necessity as a measure of public safety, its enforcement is hereby declared and it shall be in full force and effect from and after its final passage by the Commission of said City, its approval by the President of said

To All Owners of Dogs.

Farmers and owners generally will keep their dogs at home, have them in leash or muzzle them. All dogs found running at large on the streets or alleys of La Grande on or after June 15 will be killed forthwith in accordance with said ordinance.
