After this the children of the schools carried out, on the school grounds and under the direction of the teachers a beautiful program, consisting of music, drills, a maypole dance, and a mock wedding, in which all the children of the primary grade took part. Every detail of a formal wedding was incorporated in the miniature ceremony.

The little bride, Garnet Bowery, attired in a long white dress entrain, and veil, carried a bouquet of yellow roses. The groom, Merton Childers, and best man Harold Schroeder, as well as the ushers were attired in full evening dress. Ivan Storey, as the clergyman acted his part perfectly. Two little flower girls were delighted to be there also. The entire program was carried out without a noticeable hitch, the whole was a

pronounced success. Being the close of a successful year's work, parents, children and teachers lingered long on the grounds. Professor Borneman will remain for the coming year, Miss Greene left for her home in Missouri, Mrs. Harris for Seattle, and Miss Bailey for her home in Ontario, Oregon.
