DOUBLES ITS CAPITAL STOCK

LA GRANDE NATIONAL BANK HAS \$200,000 AT MASTHEAD.

Third Time Local Bank Has Raised Capital in Its History.

By wire the Comptroller of Currency recognized the request of the La Grande National bank to raise its capital stock from \$100,000 to \$200,000 and today the bank officially announces that it is working under a capital stock of \$200,000.

This is an act for some time contemplated by the directors and stockholders and the increased capital is obtained by reducing the surplus of the institution.

Cashier F. L. Meyers stated today that it was the belief of all connected with the bank that the increase of capital stock was desirable, largely for the reason that considerable of the stock would now be taken by local people.

During the history of the La Grande National bank the capital has been increased at three different times. The bank was organized in 1887 with a capital of \$60,000. In 1904 the surplus was reduced and capital stock raised to \$100,000, and now in 1914 again the surplus is reduced and the capital stock raised to \$200,000.

THREE KILLED IN AUTO WRECK

Fourth Badly Hurt, Will Die Too—Collide With U. P. Train.

Omaha, Neb., June 11.—Three persons were instantly killed and a fourth was so badly injured that he will die, in a collision between a Union Pacific Train and an automobile party. The dead are Oscar Krug, of St. Louis, Chauffeur Carl Behr, and two unidentified women. There were four occupants in the car. All were frightfully mangled.

RESOLUTE WINS SECOND RACE

Has Big Odds to Be Chosen Cup Defender Against Lipton's Craft.

Navinski, June 11.—In her second try-out race today, the Resolute again defeated the Vanitie. The second race was won by about two minutes. This race gives the Resolute the great odds of being chosen to defend the American yacht honors, which Sir Thomas Lipton is striving to wrest from American yacht sports.

Balloon Races at Portland.

Portland, Ore., June 11.—Under the auspices of the Aero Club of America, a number of the leading professional air pilots of the United States are to ascend in huge balloons here late this afternoon in a struggle of endurance. The gas bag remaining aloft the longest continuous period will receive a cash prize of \$3,000.

The following balloons started in the race: United States, pilot H. Eugene Honeywell, of St. Louis, hero of 194 races in all parts of the world; "The Million Population Club," pilot John Berry, of St. Louis, winner of the first national race in Indianapolis in 1909; the "Kansas City III," pilot Captain John Watts of Kansas City, member of America's international team in 1912 and 1913, and the Springfield, pilot Roy Donaldson of Springfield, Illinois.
