TWO LOOSE INNINGS MAR THE CONTEST.

Cove's baseball team fell before La Grande yesterday six to two in a game that, except for two innings was a fairly good presentation of the big pastime. McInnis and Geddes were the opposing gunners and both did valiant work. Weak support at critical moments cost Geddes several of the six scores which were registered against him.

Two La Grande men walked, and McInnis struck out nine, to Geddes' seven. Geddes, Dean and Motley, in the order named, figured in a double play. Conley and Pideock each got a passed ball, and La Grande got four men on first on errors and Cove two.

Cove was held blank until the eighth inning when Roy Alexander got to second on an outfield error. Dean went out McInnis to Slate, and an infield boot let Ray Alexander and his brother score on the play. Geddes singled in the ninth and was sacrificed by Carter scoring when Allen hit into the outfield. That was Cove's total score.

La Grande put three over in the second inning when Cove had a particularly bad session. Two hits however, were all that were gleaned in that canto.

The home club came through with two more hits in the third and scored one tally, repeating the sixth and seventh with timely bingles and profuse booting on Cove's side. On the whole, though it was a fairly good

game to watch except for the second inning Cove pulled herself together in the pinches and did pretty fair work. Cove sinned eight times and La Grande five.
