COVE TO BUILD FAIR PAVILION

ANNUAL CHERRY SHOW TO BE PROPERLY HOUSED.

Enthusiasm at Meeting Held There Saturday Evening.

Cove, Ore., June 16.—(Special)—Deciding to build a pavilion to house the Cherry fair and to be used for other public events in Cove, a mass meeting composed of many people from this city and surrounding country Saturday evening showed marked enthusiasm.

Speakers proclaimed the superiority of Cove's products and then called upon everyone to stand firm in an endeavor to let the outside world know of that superiority.

The dimensions of the building have not as yet been determined but there is now no longer doubt that a firstclass place will be dedicated to the Cove annual festival. It will be located in the beautiful grove near town and the grounds will be parked.

The exact date for this year's Cherry fair has not been set, as that depends largely on the condition of the crop. It is presumed however, that it will be about July 10th.

COYOTE CUTOFF WORK RUSHED

ORIGINAL ESTIMATE SET AHEAD SOMEWHAT.

Some of the Track Has Already Been Put in Place.

Pendleton, June 16.—Grading work on the Coyote cutoff and the line changes made necessary by the cutoff will be entirely finished by August 1 and the cutoff should be tracked and ready for use by November 1, possibly by October 1. The original estimate was January 1.

This is the statement of C. C. Barkley, superintendent for Twohy Bros., who are handling the big job under contract with the O.-W. R. & N. Co. Already some tracklaying work is under way. It is on the new line that is being constructed in part between Hermiston and the main line. The track will be laid to the junction and then on the cutoff from the junction to Cottonwood bend. This will permit of assembling the material for the bridge to be constructed across the Umatilla river at Cottonwood bend. This bridge is to consist of seven 70 foot spans and will rest on concrete piers and abutments.

The cutoff starts two miles west of Coyote and joins the present main line at the west end of the Stanfield yards. Line changes are made between Stanfield and Echo. The line running to Hermiston and Umatilla will also be changed so as to eliminate a big hill. The junction will be three miles west of Stanfield.

On the cutoff the heaviest grade going west will be five tenths of one per cent. Going east the heaviest grade will be six-tenths of one per cent. The maximum curve is three degrees. There will be on eight mile tangent on the cutoff, the tangent being between the Umatilla river and Coyote.

The railroad company itself will do all the track laying work. The bridge at Cottonwood Bend may also be built by the company though this is a matter not yet decided.

The news of the early completion of the cutoff is of particular local interest through the fact this place will become the freight terminal as soon as the new line goes into use. It may be necessary for the railroad company to rush work on the yards in order to have them in readiness for use when needed.
