WEEKLY EVENT IS POSTPONED

CITY COMMISSION TO CONVENE THIS EVENING

Informal Session Held By One Commissioner and Manager.

Because a majority of the city commissioners are out of town there was no formal meeting of the commission last night. Commissioner Gardner will be in town for the meeting tonight, however, and an adjourned session will be held this evening.

The Treasurer collected \$559.05 in street improvement tax and interest, \$984.90 water rentals and \$4375.00 for seven saloon licenses.

The Recorder collected \$10.00 in fines, \$18.54 sewer assessment and \$1.61 interest on same, \$8.35 rent on septic tank farm, \$2.00 for four building permits and \$1.00 for one dog license.

The Water Superintendent spent \$23.00 on repairs, \$7.50 on 2-inch line 5th and K and \$5.75 on shut-off list and \$5.75 on taps.

The fire department were out to a chimney fire on a phone call, also out to Newlin's where an old house was used as an incubator house.

The printing of electrical permits and inspection and approval blanks has been ordered.

The treasurer has called outstanding general fund warrants to Dec. 4, 1912, amounting to nearly \$1000.00.

Water warrants are all paid up. The General Fund will be over drawn \$7,000 but this will come in during the next month or two before it is needed.
