BIG RANCH DEAL AIRED.

Details of C. Murdock's Transaction Figure in Trespass Trial. (Enterprise Record-Chief.)

The replevin suit by which C. R. Fones seeks possession of personal property estimated to be worth \$11,448, and also asks heavy damages, is the latest phase of the controversy over the Day Ridge ranch of C. Murdock. Mr. Fones, through his attorney, J. A. Burleigh, alleges that he bought this personal property May 19 and 20, and has been refused possession. The suit is in the Circuit court.

three heads: \$15 a day for being kept out of the use of the work horses and other stock and implements; special damages of \$1,500 for being kept out of the use of certain breeding stock, and exemplary damages of \$1,000.

In the complaint is a long list of the personal property which Mr. Fones alleges he bought and which he asserts is withheld from him. This includes horses, cattle, hogs, wagons, hacks, plows, harrows, cultivators, blacksmith outfit, harness, grain, hay, household goods and other articles found on a large farm.

Service in this action was obtained on Mr. Murdock and Harry, his son, last week in Wallowa, where they appeared to assist in the prosecution of Mr. Fones and his associates on the charge of criminal trespass. This trial was before a jury in Justice R. McCrae's court. The three defendants—Mr. Fones, George Downing and C. E. Downing—were found guilty. They gave notice of an appeal and their case will be tried again in the Circuit court.

Holmes, general chairman of arrangements, has a little message in the line of fun entertainment programs each day, and following these announcements, came a formal announcement that the police department of La Grande has orders to be blind for the next three days. Ostrom, of the Beaver State Merchants' Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

At the close of the business session the delegates will have "other important matters" to attend to in the way of literary entertainment.

The general attendance was excellent for the first day. Cities nearby are already well represented, and the morning delegation from Portland was bigger than at first anticipated.

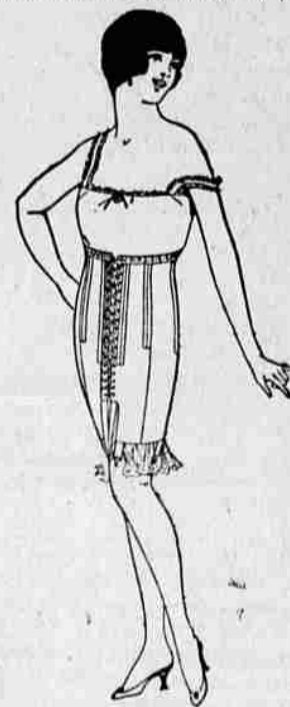
