WALLOWA WILL GET NEW MILL

LOGGING ROAD TO TAP FERTILE NORTH END.

News Announced at Enterprise Shows Big Industry to Start.

That the wonderfully rich North end of Wallowa county which has Flora for its metropolis, is to be tapped with a common-carrier logging road, is the news that is definitely announced from Enterprise. The long-looked for Duval Jackson company, known as the East Oregon company has announced its intentions finally it is said, in a news dispatch from Enterprise which goes on to say:

The sale of 120,000,000 feet of timber to the East Oregon Lumber Company by the United States forest office in Portland on Tuesday means the development of inner Wallowa County on a large scale. The East Oregon Lumber Company, a Kansas City, Mo., corporation, capitalized at \$1,250,000, will build a railroad from Enterprise 20 miles or so north into the timber at once, and will construct a sawmill at Enterprise with a daily capacity of 100,000 board feet.

Officials of the company are on the ground preparing for work. These include Duval Jackson, president; C. D. Logan, general superintendent; J. C. Edsall, construction engineer, and R. L. Carlton, resident secretary. Machinery for the plant and rails for the new road have been contracted for.

In addition to the Government timber, the company owns nearly 24,000 acres of patented land in the county, all heavily forested. Of this about 12,000 acres is intermingled with the Wallowa National forest reserve, so that the company can cut both the Government timber and private timber at the same time. These 12,000 acres were procured recently from the George Palmer Lumber Company, of La Grande.

Five years ago Mr. Jackson, president of the Southwestern Lumber Company, of Kansas City, began buying Wallowa County timber. G. E. Hayden has been his field representative.

Last year Mr. Jackson concluded to start cutting. But he wanted to get some of the reserve timber. He applied to have it cruised and advertised, and the sale was set for June 15. Mr. Jackson was the only bidder. He got the pine timber at \$2.50 a thousand.

While the Government was preparing for the sale of the reserve timber Mr. Jackson and Mr. Hayden made a trade with the Palmer company for the latter's acreage in the reserve district.

At the same time residents of Enterprise secured the right-of-way from the city to the timber on the north, about 12 miles. They also have pledged to give the East Oregon company a mill site, and have subscribed to \$40,000 of the corporation's stock. All told this little city has raised nearly \$53,000 to help bring the new industry here. By the last census Enterprise had 1272 population.

IMBLER CHOSEN MEETING PLACE

PIONEERS TO CONVENE THERE ANNUALLY.

Location Central—Former Officials Are Re-Elected for 1915.

Imbler was Saturday, and has become the permanent gathering place for the Union county pioneers in their annual meetings. The treatment accorded the hearty pioneers and their younger followers was so pleasing to the organization's chiefs and the location so central that it was decided by vote that hereafter the annual meeting shall be held there. Despite the wind which came up late in the afternoon and made the dust fly the entertainers left no stone unturned to show the hearty pioneers a royal good time. Trains from valley points crowded cars to the festive grounds and the highways were lined with cars and wagons for hours in the morning. The day's program was carried out without a hitch and many eloquent speeches were listened to. A grand picnic dinner gave just the right flavor to the occasion and recalled to many minds other dinners eaten on the plains with only stars and silent trees as company when they sat with one hand on the trusted rifle while they ate their meagre fare.

Battle in Mexico Delayed.

Torreón, June 22.—Although the outpost skirmishing is in progress about Zacatecas the indications were that the delays are due to the condition of the roads and that it will delay the general rebel attack about ten days. Against the garrison of about 10,000 men under General Barron, Villa has an army of nearly 30,000 surrounding the town. The federals are strongly entrenched and artillery will be needed to support the assault. Villa has guns but has not been able to get them through the bottomless mud. Washouts have been frequent between Canitas and Zacatecas.
