Niagara Falls, June 23.—The mediators are waiting for the assurance that the Mexican Constitutionalist representatives will join in the negotiations and that should they do so the rebels having refused their armistice their status would be unofficial. This will not interfere with the agreement. If an understanding is reached at the informal conference between Huerta and Constitutionalist it will simply be embodied in the protocol which Huerta is to sign in behalf of the present Mexico City government and the American envoys will endorse it as constitutional representatives.

C., June 23.—With more than \$20,000 in the safe and the doors of the strong box hanging by shattered hinges after an explosion of nitroglycerine, Police Constable Clarkson gave battle to three robbers early today in a pistol duel after he routed the three cracksmen who attempted to rob the Bank of Nova Scotia at Mission.
