

CRUCIAL GAME ON TOMORROW

ELGIN-LA GRANDE SERIES WILL
DETERMINE CHAMPS.

One Month Remains of League Sea-
son and Interest Grows.

With the season of the Inter-valley league nearing an end, all interest in the way of pennant-grabbing centers on the next two Sundays. Elgin and La Grande, now heading the league, meet here next Sunday and in Elgin the following Sunday, and the result of these two games will largely determine the outcome of the league. When La Grande has played two games with Elgin and two with Imbler, the league season draws to a close, yet Imbler can hardly get in the running now, and either Elgin or La Grande can be put on the skids effectively by losing the next two games.

The contest tomorrow should draw the banner crowd of the year, for if ever any real interest is going to be shown in the season's playing it will crop out tomorrow and the following Sunday.

Can the tail-end division come back again? That is the question asked today. Cove, North Powder, Elgin and Union have it out in other parts of the valley, and some keen interest is manifest wherever these ball teams have their backing.

Wallowa Season Nearly Over.

The Wallowa Sun says that the last ball game of the season for the Wallowa team, will be Sunday afternoon on the Wallowa diamond, when Wallowa and Joseph cross bats. Last Sunday Wallowa won from Joseph by a score of 12 to 4. Enterprise and Lostine played a double header at Enterprise, both games being won by Enterprise, thus completing the schedule for Lostine. Enterprise and Joseph still have another game to play, and then the season will be over. Enterprise is just one game ahead of Wallowa in the percentage column, and should Enterprise lose to Joseph, then Wallowa and Enterprise will be tied for first place.

HAL CHASE JUMPS TO FEDERAL LEAGUE.



Hal Chase, the greatest first baseman (when at his best) baseball has ever seen, has jumped to the Federal League but was enjoined Thursday.

He probably has drawn at least \$6,000 a year with the White Sox of Chicago, and will probably receive much more from the Buffalo club. Walter Johnson, the Washington pitcher, it was said, was offered a bonus of \$50,000 to join the new league, and Ty Cobb has been offered a large sum.

Frank Chance, manager of the New York Americans, traded Chase to Chicago because he had been a disturber in the club. While a great

player, it was said he had talked to many players till they were dissatisfied, and therefore failed to do much on the field. There have been rumors that he had trouble of this kind in Chicago.

In his first year with the New York Americans he revolutionized the playing of first base. For years it had been the custom of first basemen to play a very small area about the bag. Chase ran far in for bunts and then backed out almost to the right fielder. His plays were often so fast that other infielders were not prepared for them.

RACE TRACK OF 4 MILES TALKED

AUTO CLUB HOPES TO UTILIZE
PRESENT ROADWAYS.

Plans for a two or a four-mile road race track for use on stated occasions, which would make La Grande a town noted for motorcycle and automobile races such as Tacoma stages, are talked of by the Union County Automobile club. The plan in a general way calls for utilization of country roads, with corners banked to allow fast turns. Others have in mind the leasing of the old fair grounds and building a mile or a mile and a half track there for both motor and auto races. Auto fans have high hopes of getting some such system in working order before another year rolls around.
