

FORESTRY NEWS FROM MT. EMILY

PEOPLE THERE APPRECIATE WORK ON ROADS.

Huckleberry Crop Looks Doubtful This Season Says Correspondent.

Mt. Emily Lookout Station, June 30.—(Special)—Supervisor J. M. Schmitz, paid an official visit to the south end of the reserve last week. Mr. Schmitz is a very busy man, with headquarters at Walla Walla, Wash.

The huckleberry crop on Mt. Emily seems to have been almost totally killed during the cold weather early this month.

The residents of the Fox Hill and Mt. Emily sections are highly pleased with the large amount of work ordered done by the county court on the roads. The roads and trails beyond the Blumenstein place are somewhat obstructed by dead trees that fell across them during the winter.

A total of nearly 400 cords of dead timber was sold or given away last year by the Forest Service. This was hauled by farmers of the valley and teamsters from La Grande. All of it was taken from what is known as the Free Use District, near the summit of Mt. Emily.

The telephone line to the Blumenstein cabin has been repaired and is ready for service again. J. H. Blumenstein has been appointed firewarden and look-out man for this section. He will take observations for forest fires from the butte near the cabin and from other advantage points of the neighborhood.

Few people are aware of the fact that 25 percent of the gross receipts, such as grazing fees, timber sales, etc., of the National Forests are paid to the counties in which the forests are located. In addition to this, 10 percent of all receipts are available for the building of roads and trails within the forests.

COUNTY GRANGE HAS MEETING

MEDICAL SPRINGS IS MECCA FOR GRANGE FOLKS.

Then came the Grange program. Dunham Wright delivered an address of welcome in which he recited a brief history of his western home. Our deputy state master C. D. Huffman and A. P. Davis and C. C. Cate, our county agricultural agent, addressed the assembled four hundred people.

In the evening a class was instructed in the mysteries of the Fifth degree.

Good roads, good weather, good eating and a general good time, with a spirit of hospitality pervading the atmosphere combined to make this occasion one to be remembered with pleasure.

NOTICE OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT.

To Whom It May Concern: You will hereby take notice that in pur-

suance with a resolution adopted by the Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 27th day of May, 1914, creating Sewer District No. 2, Section 3, and designating and declaring the real property hereinafter described as included in and comprising said District, and in pursuance of a Resolution duly adopted by said Commission on the 27th day of May, 1914, whereby said City Commission determined the necessity of and declared its intention to improve said District and all the real property included therein as hereinafter described by laying therein a sewer and in pursuance of the Report of the Committee on Estimates, heretofore made in relation thereto, and adopted by said Commission, the City Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, will meet at the Commission Chamber of said City on the 8th day of July, 1914, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock, P. M. of said day, and consider the levy of a special assessment against all the real property benefited or affected by said proposed improvement, and grant a hearing before said Commission to all persons feeling aggrieved on account of said proposed levy of said special assessment to pay the costs and expenses thereof.

That the boundaries of the district to be benefited or affected by such proposed improvement are as follows to-wit:

Beginning at a point on the center line of North Depot St., which is north 100 feet from the north property line of "Y" Avenue, the boundary line runs thence south along the center line of north Depot Street to a point 135 feet south of the southwest property line of Jackson Avenue; thence northwesterly 100 feet from and parallel with the southwest property line of Jackson Avenue to the center line of north Fourth Street; thence north along the center line of North Fourth Street to a point 100 feet north of the north property line of "Y" Avenue; thence east 100 feet from and parallel with the north property line of "Y" Avenue to the place of beginning, all in the City of La Grande, Union County Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given you that the said City Commission proposes to levy a special assessment on all of the property affected or benefited by such proposed improvement for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of the same. That the estimated cost of such proposed improvement is the sum of \$6023.98. If you have any remonstrance to make against said proposed improvement or the proposed levy of such special assessment or feel aggrieved against the same before said Commission at the time and place above specified, or be forever thereafter barred and foreclosed from making the same.
