Norman Frees is transacting business at Vincent, on Howard Creek today, and tonight when the shadows

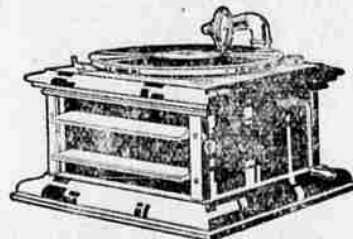
fall o'er the Wallowa, he hopes to snare some speckled beauties.
