chires were in La Grande arranging for the final touches on the road race from Elgin to La Grande and return which is to be run on the third, with Tracy Hollister, Earnest Vehrs and perhaps others as local entrants. The road which the race will be run over is laid out as follows: Leaving the grounds at Elgin the machines will take the foot hill road to Summerville go through Summerville and continue on past Conley's warehouse to Booth lane, from there through Island City and to the Leighton garage at La Grande, returning immediately. The trip measures just an even 25 miles each way. From Summerville to Conley's warehouse or Conley's Spur the road is an even straight stretch of hard clay and as smooth as glass. The riders predict that on this stretch which is some 11 or 12 miles long a speed of 50 or 60 miles can be made with ease and safety.

Prospector's "Find" Excites

Baker, June 30.—The appearance here yesterday of Jim McCabe, an Auburn prospector, with a bottle of gold dust and nuggets worth about \$60 and the story of uncovering a pocket from which, according to his story, he has taken about \$3,000, caused much interest and the yarn was magnified in the telling until the old days were recalled and a rush to Auburn seemed imminent. It was stated that the amount taken from the pocket by McCabe was anywhere from \$100 up to \$22,000, evidently increasing as the story was passed around.

Bill Mix, a well known prospector,

has a claim adjoining McCabe's, which is on the head waters of Elks creek. "Pocket gold" has always been a feature of the Auburn camp and small seams containing free gold have often brought large sums to their discoverers. That many are still uncovered and awaiting the fortunate prospector is certain, as indicated by the good luck reported at intervals by those still delving in the Auburn hills for the precious metal.

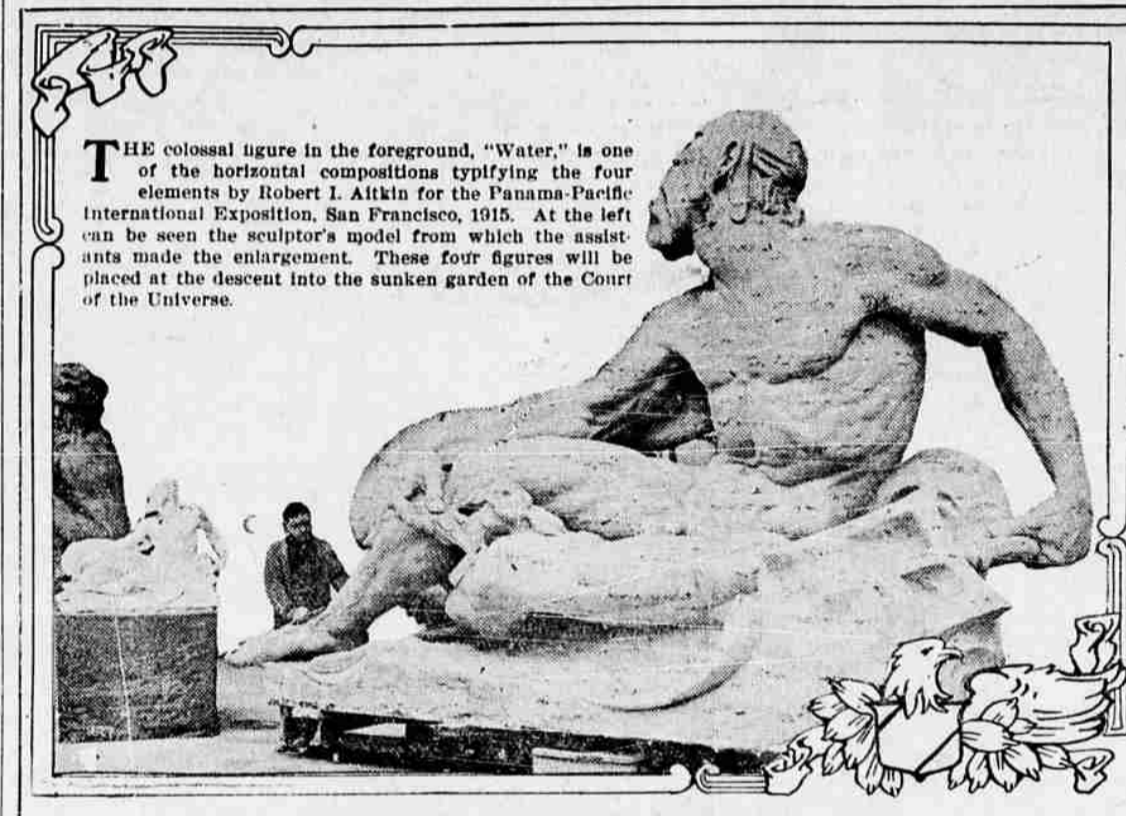
Penny Sportsmen Meet.

BOUNTY FUNDS OF STATE GONE

COMPLICATIONS ARISE OVER STATE ORDERS.

County Clerk Wright Will Lay Matter Before County Court.

When the county court meets tomorrow County Clerk Ed Wright will lay before it the county scalp bounty situation which has taken a peculiar turn in Oregon. The secretary of state recently sent out notices to all county clerks saying that because the scalp bounty fund in the state was exhausted, the state would no longer pay half of the bounty money which the county clerks issue. In Baker, and it is said in some other counties, the county courts have decided to refuse to issue warrants if the state won't pay half. Information reaching La Grande however is to the effect that the state and county must continue to pay bounties whether the fund is exhausted or not.

In view of the many complications to the question, it will come up before the county court tomorrow and will in all probability be settled by an attorney general decision later on.

No More Bounties in Baker.

Baker, June 30.—No more bounties will be paid on wild animals in the State of Oregon after July 1. This information was received by County Clerk Combs from Secretary of State Olcott, who stated that the bounty fund is exhausted and there is no

certainty that the next legislature will make an appropriation.

Following this information, the Baker county court made an order, which was filed yesterday, that Baker county would not pay bounties from county funds, therefore after July 1 no more bounties will be paid in Baker county.

The present bounty law was made two years ago and the action of the legislature was depended on to provide appropriations. With the depletion of the appropriation created at the last session, the revenue of a large number of trappers and hunters will be cut down, especially in the counties east of the mountains abounding in wild game, for which bounties were offered.
